## Remembrance: Why Bother

One hundred years ago, on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918, an armistice came into force which brought to an end four long years of bloody and exhausting warfare. The conflict was global in nature and far-reaching in its impact. But why should we remember the tragic events of World War One, a brutal struggle between nations that happened so long ago?

Certainly, there are many in our society who do not seem to value remembrance commemorations, including current Labour leader Jeremy Corbyn who, in 2016, suggested that he could not see "what there is to commemorate about the First World War". Similarly, poet Philip Larkin famously described the act of remembrance as 'solemn-sinister wreath-rubbish'. We would argue, however, that there are a number of very important reasons why we should continue to mark the end of the First World War.

Whilst critics may suggest that the Remembrance service is obsolete because there are now no living veterans of the First World War - the last, Florence Green, died in 2012- some people may still have relatives who saw active service in WW1. It is important that their contributions are valued. Furthermore, the day that originally was designed to commemorate the end of the First World War has now morphed into much more than just that. It is now known to remember other conflicts including WW2, the Korean War, the Indochina Wars, the Greek Civil War, the Paraguayan Civil War and India's Operation Polo.

In his 2014 speech to mark the centenary of the First World War, David Cameron, the then Prime Minister, suggested that the soldiers 'signed up to preserve the principles of freedom and sovereignty.' He went on to argue that 'we should never fail to cherish the peace between nations' and that we should always make time to stop, pause and re-pledge our commitment to peace.

Above all, we should continue to remind ourselves of what we are capable of doing to one another.

## A Life Turned About: From Migrant to Academic of Migrant Studies

Last Friday it felt as if we stopped the clocks, albeit briefly, to listen to the remarkable testimony of Tesfalem H. Yemane. This Politics Society guest, now completing research at the University of Leeds, and in so many ways unremarkable, shared a story that was the stuff of documentaries and news reels.



Born in Eritrea where he completed his undergraduate studies, Tesfalem found that teaching and researching political science, even at a fairly elementary level, was liable to end in government investigation, arrest and imprisonment. The neurosis of the state allows for an almost non-existent level of self-reflection and analysis. Tesfalem became a refugee in neighbouring Sudan, living in an UNHCR camp for migrants. Driven by his ambition for a full and fulfilling life, undiminished by circumstance, he managed to secure a scholarship to study at a postgraduate level in Beijing, China. Many moons later and he now finds himself involved in a number of Yorkshire-based organisations assisting the plight of migrants and refugees.

Besides this retelling of his own circumstances, Tesfalem is now researching the nature of migration globally, exploring the various push and pull factors involved. One of these particular to his work is the notion of 'soft power', that is the way in which the projected and promoted images of the UK abroad can contribute to an image of country that becomes embedded in the psyche of migrants. By way of illustration the Premier League of UK football works as a great source of not just commercial revenue, but in promoting an image of a diverse, inclusive and dynamic country. Tesfalem was enormously articulate and demonstrated such gentle intelligence as he wove together the fabric of his own most personal experiences with his scholarly research.

## Diagnostic Career Testing at Yarm

Last week saw the end of a week of diagnostic testing for careers for pupils in the Fifth Year. The Morrisby software uses hi-tech psychometric methods similar to those now used by recruiters within industry. The pupils completed almost two hours of short tests and responses in order to generate a detailed report on and evaluate their aptitudes, in terms of mechanical, spatial, verbal, numeral and abstract, as well as interpreting their interests and preferred work styles. This is all then converted into suggestions for appropriate subjects for post-16 study, as well as offering a diverse range of future professions to explore.

This is just the first part of the process; pupils will now respond to the findings and all of this material will form the basis of a half hour long interview that they will have next week with a professional, external interviewer-adviser. Parents of pupils in the current Fourth Year will be offered this package of advice, information and guidance in the autumn term of next academic year.

Sedgwick spoke fondly of his career, requiting the famous saying "Do what you love, and you'll never have to work another day in your life", and explained the advantages and disadvantages of an author's lifestyle. The pupils were fascinated by his determination and skill, having written 41 published novels that have been translated into many different languages.

Sedgwick answered the pupils' burning questions with enthusiasm and always elaborated creatively. The main focus of the conversation was the novel *Revolver*, which 2.4 have been eagerly studying this half term. This novel tells a story of a young boy named Sig and explores how he copes with the loss of his father, Einar. Sig finds himself in a dilemma when a man shows up at the front door demanding lost gold and threatening to take Sig's life.


Many intriguing questions were shared with the author including "What or whom inspired you to pursue your writing career?" and "Have you ever considered turning one of your novels into a film adaptation?"

## Junior Hockey & Rugby Tour to Holland

During October half-term, 70 pupils from Second and Third Years embarked on a 6 day tour to Holland to compete in boys' and girls' hockey and boys' rugby. The group left School midday on Friday, 18th October to take part in what would be a non-stop adventure comprised of overnight ferries, fixtures, training sessions, a high ropes course, a visit to a theme park and bowling.

After an overnight ferry from Newcastle to Amsterdam, it was time for the first fixtures of our tour. The boys' rugby team faced Haarlem Rugby Club, whilst the girls' hockey squad took on Heerhugowaard Hockey Club.

The boys had quite the challenge against Haarlem as both the U13 and U14 opponents looked a lot bigger than the Yarm squad. For our Second Years, the opposition's physical advantage was a tough feat and despite Yarm playing the better game of rugby, Haarlem were able to break away on three occasions to score tries in the first half. However, following a rallying team talk from Mr Ivey, the boys stepped it up in the second half and eventually equalised through winger Will Ferguson. Ben Dempsey played brilliantly and punched well about his size and Timmy Foley, the stand out performer, did an excellent job at tackling and consistently carrying the ball through contact. However, Haarlem upped the ante in the closing stages to score two tries and secure the win.

The Third Years faced a similar challenge but Yarm's superior skills, teamwork and organisation meant this game went to the wire. The tackling and physicality of Yarm was a sight to behold; Man of the Match Matthew McCullagh looked particularly strong breaking through the lines on more than one occasion. Haarlem had a three point lead going into the closing minutes and they appeared to have the game wrapped up, however a break from captain Junior Newton led to him drawing the full back and skilfully sending Jacob Rutter under the post to bring home a win for Yarm.



The girls were greeted by players, coaches and parents from Heerhugowaard Hockey Club who welcomed us into their club house for some refreshments prior to the matches. The U13s and mixed U13/14s played first while the U14s stayed in the club house and took the opportunity to get to know their U14 hosts.

The U13/14 team started their game well and scored in the first quarter. The opposition reacted quickly and started to make it much more difficult for Yarm to keep them at bay for the remainder of the match. The girls battled hard and worked for one another, making sure they minimised their attacks to keep the lead and finish the first day with a win.

In quite the opposite way, the U13s found themselves starting on the back-foot having never come up against a press like it previously. Once the girls adjusted they started to move the ball at speed through defence which allowed them to find space. As their confidence grew, so did their attacking play and they started to demonstrate some lovely hockey. The game was on a knife edge with seconds to go before the final whistle when Elise found a through ball to Lexie who took the goal well, slotting it past the keeper and into the bottom right corner. Yarm won the match 8-7 – what a game!



The U14s started the match with a little confidence, predicting a draw against their new friends. However soon into the first quarter, the girls were down 3-0 and feeling quite surprised. A team talk at quarter time got the girls fired up again and they came into the second quarter playing like their usual selves: reducing the opposition's space in defence and opening up the pitch in attack. At half time we had levelled the playing field and were starting to gain control of the match. In the second half we pushed forward again and took the lead, but not before Jasmine decided to head the ball in from a short corner and had to sit the rest of the match out. The match finished with an impressive 6-4 win to Yarm.

After a night of bowling and a morning spent adventuring across a high ropes course (similar to Go Ape), we travelled to Overgangsklasse to watch a top level men's game which hopefully inspired some of our players about the possible levels they could reach in future. We then played the boys' first hockey games and the girls' second against Breda HC and Prisenbeek HC.

The set up for Holland is second to none; each facility we travelled to boasted at least 6 pitches and a huge membership that allowed clubs to



put out up to 90 teams - we were expecting some real tough opposition. However, both the U13A, U13B and U14 boys won their games comfortably due to the impressive level these age groups are already reaching and the slight mismatch of the opposition. In fact, the U14 boys won 11-0 with Nathan Muzawazi scoring 4 goals, Theo Grylls and Tom Graham looking sharp at the back and the outstanding player of the tour Charlie Thompson dominating the middle of the pitch and throwing 50 yard passes that pierced the opposition defence time and again.

The U13s dominated at A & B level, scoring in excess of 10 goals in each of the games they played. Oscar Shaw and Harry Jackson put together some exciting displays whilst Oscar Thomas, Marcus Walters and Finn Davie were a constant threat.

In the girls' games, the U13 and U14 teams won comfortably and were able to work effectively on their passing as well as their individual skills. The U13/14s played well but lost to a stronger, well drilled opposition - though they were umpired by the best dressed umpire we'd ever seen (think top hat)! Despite a loss, the girls tried some different positions and learnt to appreciate what they could do in their usual positions to work better together as a team.

The U13 team were very keen to show their skills and having just watched a very good professional adult game, were eager to deliver an excellent game of hockey. The combination of the girls' energy and skills were too much for the Dutch team they faced and Yarm won this match convincingly. It did give us a chance to try out new ideas and formations which in turn benefit us in our final match of the tour. The girls played with great sportsmanship throughout, which was also important.

After a late return, we rose early the following morning to travel to the very famous and exciting Efteling Theme Park. This was to prove one of the highlights of the tour with some amazing rides for the pupils to enjoy (not to mention the staff) and much merchandise won, leaving many fewer seats on the coach on the way home!

We then travelled to Schiedam HC for our last fixtures which were to prove an even more impressive venue than the previous, boasting nine water based pitches and an impressive club house.

The Third Year boys had a much more competitive game but still ran out 5-0 winners, a mark of how quickly this team is developing. The U13B team were equally dominant with impressive displays from the likes of Henry Parker and Timmy Foley.

The U13A game proved a much tighter affair and both teams looked equally matched. However, Yarm got off to a rapid start with player of the tour Will Ferguson finishing two Argentinian Backhands from the top of the circle. Max Mowbray and James McGee were equally clinical, but the opposition came back into the game time and again. In an end to end encounter, Yarm eventually came out with an 8-4 win.

In the girls' games both the U13s and U13/14s had well deserved wins. In the U13/14 game the girls had the opportunity to put into practice what they had learnt in the previous two games, with midfield supporting defence throughout and defence ensuring they had the D covered at all times. Up front some stunning goals were scored by Nicole Lambert and Rachel Richardson following super runs up both wings. It was in this match that Ava Cant really showed off how much she had progressed, putting in a solid performance in both defence and midfield, leading to her eventual award of most improved player for this team.

The U13 team played some superb hockey, moving the ball quickly to Scarlett who utilised it well in on the right when the Dutch team pressed the play at the other side. Defensively Issy Speight was outstanding and was supported with calm, clinical defending from Cara and Harriet. Up front the Lexie and Elise 'partnership' caught a very experienced keeper off guard on many occasions, with Estelle and Kyra ensuring the ball was fed through at the right time to bring success. A great final win for this team.

The U14s had a much more competitive match to finish their tour, with us taking the 2-1 win with stellar performances from Emma in the midfield who was beating players for fun at times, Rosie with her hard work and composure at the



back and Izzy and Jasmine for their super positional play both in attack and defence. Not forgetting our penalty flick saver Phoebe who had an excellent tour both on and off the pitch, embracing everything the tour had to offer.

Schiedam HC proved to be fantastic hosts and served us up an amazing tea before we travelled back to our accommodation for a very late finish to the day.

After a 6.30am wake up the following morning (Izzie Speight was not amused), the group packed up their belongings and travelled back to Schiedam for some rugby and hockey coaching which the pupils had opted into. An exhausted party returned back to school on the Wednesday lunchtime for a well-earned half term!
