Well done also to Samuel Isukapatla and Alex Prideaux who gave a good account of themselves during the day.

The Under-12 section was a tough one but our players did very well. Nethuki Mudduwa, Luke Palmer, and Aditri Kulkarni all qualified for the Gigafinal. Special mention must also go to Felicia Jude, Edie Redhead-Sweeney and Avighna Arvind who also played some long exhausting games.

It was a fabulous celebration of chess and we are now looking forward to seeing how well our young stars do at the Gigafinal.

#### **National Schools Quiz**

Who was the King of England during the US war of Independence?

Questions such as these proved no bother at all to our school quiz teams last week, with our A and B teams qualifying from their semi-final for the National Schools General Knowledge Quiz Final. This represents a remarkable achievement: as far as we are aware, we are the first school to have two teams qualify for the same final.

The questions were so much harder than the first round, but Yarm 1 (consisting of Aisling T., Marawan S., Benjamin F. and Olivia T.) raced into an early lead, closely followed by Yarm 2 (Tom P., Samuel E., Hannah C. and Annalise D.). Yarm 3 (Ella F., Auden A., Niall E. and Imogen C.) were also giving a good account of themselves but as the competition went on, it was nip-and-tuck between Yarm 1, St John's College and Byfleet Primary from Surrey.

The last round—which sees each question worth 100 points—saw Yarm 1 dominate and in the end they scored an impressive 1835 points. Yarm 2 finished strongly to come 3rd, thereby ensuring both teams reach the final, which takes place in London next month. Yarm 3 finished in 33rd and just missed out on qualifying for the final as a highest scoring runner-up. Special mention must go to Olivia and Benjamin, who were highest individual scorers in the semi-final from any team!

### 7 questions to help you start a conversation with your child about online safety

THIS WILL GIVE YOU A GOOD OVERVIEW OF THE TYPES OF THINGS YOUR CHILDREN ARE DOING ON THEIR DEVICES, ALONG WITH THEIR INTERESTS. REMEMBER THAT THEY MIGHT NOT TELL YOU EVERYTHING THEY ARE USING, SO IT IS A GOOD IDEA TO ASH THEM TO SHOW YOU THEIR DEVICE. BECAUSE NEW APPS AND GAMES ARE RELEASED REGULARLY, IT IS IMPORTANT TO HAVE THIS CONVERSATION OFTEN TO ENSURE YOU ARE UP TO DATE WITH WHAT THEY ARE DOING.

Which websites do you enjoy using and why?

AS IN THE TIP ABOVE, ASKING THIS QUESTION WILL ALLOW YOU TO FIND OUT WHAT YOUR CHILD IS DOING ONLINE. AND ENCOURAGE POSITIVE CONVERSATIONS ABOUT THEIR ONLINE ACTIVITY. ASK THEM HOW THEY USE THE WEBSITES, AND TAKE AN INTEREST IN HOW THEY CAN USE THEM IN A POSITIVE WAY, ALSO ASKING THEM TO SHOW YOU IF POSSIBLE.





How does this game/app work? Can I play?

SHOW A GENUINE INTEREST IN WHAT THEY ARE DOING. WHILST YOU ARE PLAYING A GAME OR USING AN APP WITH THEM, IT MIGHT HIGHLIGHT SOMETHING THAT THEY DON'T NECESSARILY THINH IS A DANGER TO THEM. IF THEY ACT LIHE THEY DON'T WANT TO SHARE THEIR ACTIVITIES WITH YOU, QUESTION WHY.

### Do you have any online friends?

CHILDREN CAN FORM POSITIVE RELATIONSHIPS WITH PEOPLE ONLINE, AND THIS HAS BECOME MORE COMMON THANKS TO ONLINE MULTI-PLAYER OPTIONS, BUT THEY MAY NOT FULLY UNDERSTAND THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN A FRIEND AND A STRANGER. YOU COULD MAKE THE QUESTION MORE SPECIFIC TO YOUR CHILD, FOR EXAMPLE: "HAVE YOU MENTONE ONLINE THAT YOU LIKE TO PLAY GAMES WITH?" THEY MAY NOT WANT TO SHARE THIS INFORMATION WITH YOU, SO ENSURE YOU TEACH THEM ABOUT HEALTHY RELATIONSHIPS.





ALTHOUGH YOU MAY BE THE ADULT THEY TRUST THE MOST, SOME CHILDREN STRUGGLE TO TALH ABOUT WHAT HAPPENS ONLINE DUE TO CONFUSION OR EMBARRASSMENT. BECAUSE OF THIS THEY MAY STRUGGLE TO APPROACH THE NORMAL PEOPLE WHO WOULD HELP, SUCH AS YOURSELF OR A TEACHER. HAVE A CHAT TO YOUR CHILD ABOUT EXACTLY WHERE THEY CAN GO FOR HELP, AND HOW THEY CAN REPORT ANY ACTIVITY THAT THEY BELIEVE IS INAPPROPRIATE ONLINE.

Do you know what your personal information is?

YOUR CHILD MAY ALREADY HNOW WHAT THEIR PERSONAL INFORMATION IS BUT THEY MIGHT NOT THINH ABOUT HOW IT CAN BE SHARED. HAVE A CONVERSATION OUT WHAT PERSONAL INFORMATION IS AND HOW THIS CAN AFFECT THEM IF IT IS HARRED BEYOND THE INTENDED RECIPIENT. IT IS IMPORTANT THAT YOUR CHILD UNDERSTANDS THE DANGERS OF SHARING CONTACT DETAILS OR PHOTOS, AS INFORMATION SUCH AS THIS CAN SPREAD QUICKLY ONLINE.





CHILDREN MAY NOT UNDERSTAND THE NEGATIVE IMPACTS OF DEVICE OR GAME ADDICTION. TALK To them openly about healthy habits and ash whether or not them spending time online or playing a game is affecting their sleep, performance at school or if they are generally losing interest in other activities. You may lead on to encouraging alternative activities and discussing the introduction of time limits when at home.
