


In Year 6 this week...

Come in wearing PE/Games kit



FOR ANDROID DEVICES:




FOR APPLE DEVICES:

6) Congratulations! You are all set and on your phone screen you should see the Yarm School logo which is now your very own shortcut to team sheets etc.




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


SAVING THE PLANET! PRELOVED UNIFORM



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Yarm Prep Baccalaureate

You will hopefully have seen the new **Yarm Prep Baccalaureate** booklets brought home this week with your child. The YPB is an opportunity for the children to:

- Develop new skills,
- Stretch themselves; and
- Recognise their talents and achievements.

Every child in the Prep School can do it! The overall aim is to encourage and recognise pupil involvement in their school, with a clear focus on our School Values. There are also elements of *Education for Social Responsibility* within the tasks set—all of which are age-appropriate and achievable based on the year group of each child.



What do the children need to do?

Each page of the YPB covers one of our School Values. On each page, a child needs to complete **four TASKS** and the **PROJECT**. These need to be dated and signed by a teacher. Form time will be used to do this. There are also lunchtime club on Tuesdays for children to do this with Mr Stone.

What are the tasks?

The tasks are based around each School Value and offer a mix of those that can be achieved in school and those that will need some support at home to complete. Some will be completed during day-to-day life at school (and at home!), so we are encouraging children to look for these first before exploring and tackling some of the more challenging tasks.



Four tasks need to be completed from the 7/8 under each School Value. They need to be dated and signed by a teacher.

What are the projects?


The projects are designed to promote the School Values. All your child has to do is record how they have demonstrated each value—on one side of A4 paper—and present it to their teacher or Mr Stone.

Some examples might include: demonstrating 'Safe' by producing a poster for Safer Internet Day; highlighting how they are being 'Resourceful' by drawing some diagrams of how an old item was fixed; or showing how they are 'Ambitious' by putting together a report and pictures of an assembly/event they took part in.

What do parents need to do?

- Discuss and share with your child what they are doing.
- Work with them to complete each of the projects (and sign them off!)
- Encourage your children to come along to the lunchtime clubs on Tuesdays.
- Make sure that the YPB booklet is kept safe and secure—both at home and at school!

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

Roblox is one of the most popular video games on the market. By 2020, the game's makers were claiming that more than half of children in the USA playit. As a 'sandbox' title, Roblox offers a huge amount of creative freedom it late play. gaming experiences with the Roblox Studio to build custom levels and games, which can then be shared with other players online. Roblox fosters creative thinking and enjoys a robust online community of fans.

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CONTACT WITH STRANGERS

Roblox encourages players to communicate online (including a group chat facility). This could expose children to risks such as scammers, online predators, harassment, griefers and more. The in-game chat has some filters, but isn't perfect: players can still send harmful messages to others - such as scam links or general hostility - while predators can reach out to children directly.

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PUBLIC SERVERS

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

ONLINE DATERS

ONLINE DATIENS These are also called 'ODers' and are quite common in Robiox. An ODer is an individual who joins a game with the intention of finding someone to date online – and eventually meet in person. Advice for Parents & Carers

Roblox's private messaging function raises the risk of children being contacted by people they may not want to speak with – potentially leading to bullying, harassment, toxicity and scam attempts. The game allows you to disable messages from anyone who hasn t bead as a friend on your child's account.

DISABLE PRIVATE MESSAGING

SET PARENTAL CONTROLS

TAXI

Roblox comes with several parental control options, which are explained well on the game's official website. it's essential to enter the correct date of birth for your child, as that allows Roblox to automatically apply the appropriate chat filters. The game also allows parents and corres to set monthly spending restrictions and monitor their child's account.

MONITOR SPENDING

If they don't understand they're using real money, it's easy for children to accidentally spend a sizeable amount in the game. Using parental controls to place limits on their spending will help avoid any nasty financial surprises. Ensuring that you have two-factor authentication on your payment accounts also makes it harder for your child to spend money inadvertently.

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If your child has some genuine friends to play Robiox online with, paying for a private or VIP server decreases the risk of contact from strangers. Even then, however, some players could invite other people – who might no necessarily be child friendly – Into the private server. DEALING WITH STRANGERS

At some point in their development, your child will need to learn how to deal with strangers online. Show them how to block and report any users who are upsetting them or asking uncomfortable questions.
