Remembering Felix Buckley



This week we were pleased to announce to the newly returned members of the Upper Sixth the arrangements for their mock interview programme. Knowing that all students will at some point face the need to be interviewed, be it for university or apprenticeship applications, to secure a placement or internship, or eventually for those job applications, the experience will provide vital preparation.

The event designed by the Careers Department and organised by Deputy Head of Careers, Miss Caroline Rhodes, will be held at Yarm School on the evening of 1st November. Almost 120 members of the U6 will be offered a personalised, bespoke one-on-one interview. They will choose from either an external interviewer for those soon to be interviewed or those students preferring this arrangement, or an internal interview provided by an experienced interviewer from the staff body for those students who either prefer this dynamic or are in a still organic stage of decision-making. The first wave of university applications will be sent off before half-term, with the vast majority of students' applications being sent off throughout the duration of this autumn term.

It promises to be an exciting event with students guided in advance over what makes for a successful interview, and with interviewers providing immediate feedback to the students. We are most appreciative in advance for those many external and interviewers who will be giving up their time to ensure the students are best prepared for their future trajectories.

Applying for an EY Business Apprenticeship



Apprenticeships are becoming far more popular and as someone who was never particularly interested in the University route, the EY business apprenticeship felt like the correct decision when considering a post A-level option. I originally found out about the course at the beginning of Lower Sixth when former pupil and now EY employee Daniel Orlopp gave a talk at one of Miss Rhodes' working lunches. At this point I had never been entirely set on the idea of university and was in the process of looking for alternatives. Daniel informed us of the various ways into working at EY: an apprenticeship application, post-graduate scheme and the Business Academy. The idea of the Business Academy instantly piqued my interest and I began to research and pursue a way onto the internship. The week-long work experience program would put you into a various team within the business (I was put into the Indirect tax team based in their Leeds office) in which you would complete various tasks set by your mentor relating to the line of work.

After Daniel's visit to Yarm, I waited until the applications had opened for the academy and applied shortly after. The process which candidates undertake is identical to those applying to the actual apprenticeship which would take place for the Upper Sixth in the January of 2023: a formal submission to the course, followed by mathematical and psychometric testing. If you were successful at these stages you then move on to a telephone interview with a senior associate at the business and once successful there, you move on to the business academy itself. During this article, I am not trying to promote the course for my own benefit or push you away - I am simply trying to give the most realistic understanding possible. The academy is incredibly competitive with only 1 in 200 applicants being accepted, compared to the likes of Oxford and Cambridge Universities where the acceptance rate in comparison is 34 in 200 (who apply). However, what EY looks for in candidates is different from universities which is why I believe it is a thoroughly worthwhile experience. I am positive that various teachers and Heads of Year during my time at Yarm can agree I have never been the most academic of students which is why doing further research into the EY course gave me some hope that I could stand out above the rest of the applicants. The company's policy on student recruitment is that it is based on more than just grades. Work ethic and experiences through one's life are far more important than a grade on a piece of paper. Personality and skills become incredibly handy when applying (students completing their D of E and YBACC will be at an advantage) as they are more interested in what you can bring to a work environment. During my telephone interview, none of the questions I was asked entailed academic performance or ability, they were all situational or behavioural. They are simply looking for the right kind of worker to join their team and when participating in the week after being accepted, it really did show.

When doing research about EY before starting the week, articles always expressed how nice the people are. I merely brushed this off as promotion as every work place would say this however, it really is true. From the moment I stepped through the door to when I left, I never felt like just an intern. The people there are all truly helpful, kind and chatty which resulted in me joining the team for daily meals (provided for us by the company) and nights out after the day's work had concluded. The work was not at all what I expected as well. On the first day I was given a case study (which I know Miss Rhodes would love) detailing a scenario that could happen within my service line. After completing this, the team were happy with my performance and I began to work with real clients for the remainder of my time. An aspect of this that I believe is truly enticing is the complexity and variety of work. One day involved working with a supermarket's own wholesaler, discussing VAT rates on products which can lead to some interesting conversations and debates within the team which can cost a business a fair amount of money (whether a macaroon was a cake or a biscuit). This simple, almost insignificant debate ended up impacting the entire way the operation functioned and gave enjoyment and meaning to the work conducted. The next day involved visiting a casino that had employed the firm to write the T&C's for their new slot machines which required interesting discussion and research. This element of the job wasn't just because I was the intern there for the week but genuine work that is completed by the firm. It was some of the most entertaining and fulfilling work I had conducted to this date.

The week concluded with a guide on next steps for applicants who were successful through the week in showing their team they would be a worthwhile member of the team. We said our final goodbyes and I am now eagerly awaiting the final interview in the coming month. I do believe this route into the business apprenticeship is truly worthwhile for anyone seeking a different option to university and if you prefer to learn on the job rather than in the classroom, I would highly recommend the academy. However, even if the University route is your main option, don't cast aside the idea of a degree apprenticeship as they provide all the benefits of university whilst getting paid an incredibly competitive salary and still experiencing the so-desired "uni experience". My advice to anyone applying this year in the Lower Sixth or to future applicants is to remain confident in your own abilities - these people want you to have the best experience possible with them and showing that you fit in with their ethics is nothing to be nervous about but something to enjoy.

Inter-House Tug O' War

Last Friday saw the traditional curtain raiser to inter-House competition in the form of the Sixth Form Tug O'War. The origins of the competition are lost in the mists of time but once again we were pleased to see the Rope of War summoned from the hidden vault where it is guarded during the rest of the year. Legend has it that the Rope was donated by the grateful master of an 18th century cargo vessel whose ship grounded leaving the port of Yarm on the ebbing tide and was hauled to safety by 32 local school children. Perhaps the modern competition is a nod to the community spirit and teamwork of our predecessors. Whatever the history this is always a fiercely contested competition and last year's winners Aidan House were strongly fancied to retain their crown.

Thanks are due to Mrs Smith, Mr Matthewman and the Sodexo team for providing a splendid pre-match barbecue enjoyed by students and staff in the dining hall and sixth form area.

In the first round, favourites Aidan faced a spirited Bede outfit who under their new leader Mr Lyle made up for limited firepower with determined enthusiasm. They were, however, no match for the well drilled Aidan who, inspired by their new Head of House, Mr Shanahan, made short work of Bede up and down hill winning by two pulls to nil.

Cuthbert and Oswald seemed closely matched; Mr Alexander's pre-match team talk along with disciplined organisation and well-orchestrated timing proved nearly a match for the heavier Oswald outfit but perseverance, determination and a capitalizing on a couple of costly slips from Cuthbert saw Oswald home by two pulls to nil.

Equally it can build up experience that will show your level of engagement and enthusiasm in a later application. For some courses work experience is actually essential. Over the summer holidays, I was lucky enough to have a week's work experience at a local robotics and automation firm called Labman. I got to work in many business areas, learning more about what it's like to be a mechanical, electrical and software engineer. I had the opportunity to work on a range of projects that will go out to

clients all over the world - working on these real projects was a fantastic opportunity and very exciting. This level of trust is a testament to Labman's culture - it was amazing to see a company that is not only innovative with technology but also in its working environment - the office (with climbing wall and go-karts amongst other unique facilities) would not look out of place in Silicon Valley! My mentor was very enthusiastic and encouraging and the experience has further confirmed that I want to follow an engineering pathway - I would encourage anyone interested in engineering to actively seek this sort of work experience.

Over the summer I spent a few days completing work experience with Fox Aircraft Engineering at Bagby Airfield. The company works to service and complete checks on light aircraft. I was able to assist the team with completing a

50 hour check on a Tomahawk and a 100 hour check on a New Zealand aerobatics aircraft. This included removing many panels, learning lots about aircraft engines and I ended the experience with a flight check which involved flying around the local area in a Saratoga II HP aircraft. The experience gave me valuable experience working with engines working in the mechanical engineering field.



Emily takes Third Place in the Country at Pony Club Eventing Championship!

On the 19th and 20th of August I took part in the National Pony Club Eventing Championships Section 100C, this is a combination of dressage, showjumping and cross country.

Dressage is like a routine that you have to remember and you get marked out of 10 for every movement - after this I was placed 2nd. That afternoon I did the showjumping - this is where you must jump a course of coloured jumps but if you knock one down you get an additional 4 faults, and if you go too slowly you get a fault for each second you go too slow.

The following day I had to compete in the cross country, arguably the hardest part. Cross country is a long course of wooden jumps that you have to go round usually spaced out over 3-4 fields or around 4500 metres. You have to overcome different obstacles like steep hills, steps, ditches and water jumps. I finished with a clear round but a couple of time penalties as I was on a small pony which isn't as fast and the horse that the course was designed for. That put me into 3rd place out of all the other people in the country that qualified.
