



'The 12 Days of Christmas' are represented by artwork carefully created by pupils, and displayed in shop windows. When Brexit happened the Polish and German company that designed the parts of the lasers struggled to get the parts to his company. He also struggled during Covid as he had to lose 50% of his staff members.

Mr McBain started out in the military at the age of seventeen, where he studied electrical engineering. After he left the army he went into a company that sold lasers. But he decided that he could service and market laser machines better than the company he worked for.

Overall, we thought this experience was extremely valuable as we learnt important lessons on business and that you don't have to always know what you want to do or sell in a business.

TikTok is a free social media platform that lets users create, share and watch short videos ranging anywhere from 15 seconds to 10 minutes in duration. The app gained notoriety for its viral dances, trends and celebrity cameos and can be a creative, fun platform for teens to enjoy. Now available in 75 languages, it has more than a billion active users worldwide (as of spring 2022) and is most popular with the under-16 age bracket. In fact, a 2022 Ofcom report found TikTok to be the most-used social media platform for posting content, particularly among young people aged 12 to 17.

Introduced in late 2022, the 'TikTok Now' feature lets users post a daily video or photo at the exact same time as their friends. Users receive a synchronised notification at a random time of day, giving them three minutes to take a video or real-time photo. This addition can not only be a distraction to young people but could lead to them inadvertently sharing private content such as their location.

MAKE ACCOUNTS PRIVATE

Although under-16s will have their TikTok account set to private by default, bypassing this setting is relatively easy. However, parer have the ability to manually set their child's account to private – meaning that their vide won't be visible to strangers and they won't i able to exchange messages with people wha aren't on their friends list.

READ THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that your child might be spending too much time on TikTok, or that they've been emotionally affected by something inappropriate or upsetting that they've seen, it's important to know how to spot the possible signs. Increased irritability and a lack of concentration are potential red flags, a are failing to complete homework or regularly not eating meals
