




Year 3 French

School Council Minutes—Tuesday 10th January 2023

<u>Attendees</u>—Form captains, all house captains and most school captains were present (Brunel and Stephenson vice-captains and one school captain were not present).

This School Council meeting was an OPEN FORUM. Form captains were asked to collate any ideas their forms had that they wanted to raise at council level. These were then shared in small groups before Mr Stone went through each of them.

The School Council then selected a number of ideas that would be shared with Mr Sawyer and Prep MT by the School Captains in their weekly meeting for further discussion.

Mr Stone thanked the captains for asking their forms for their thoughts.

These ideas were selected by the School Council for further discussion between the School Captains, Mr Sawyer and Prep MT:

- Hold an optional talent show for the whole school;
- Shorter assemblies, so they do not run on too long into morning break;
- Call a class at a time for lunch, not a year group at a time (teachers to be asked to do this);
- Girls to be allowed to wear hair down or up (it was discussed why girls have to wear hair up);
- Children to vote on what sports they can take part in in PE lessons;
- More books, especially AR books on the higher levels;
- Special 'cold breaks', where children have the option to stay indoors if it is too cold.

The following ideas regarding clubs and activities were also raised and will be explored by Mr Stone:


- Airfix, trading cards

- Teachers to please keep a close eye on bulldog games as some children don't play fairly.

House General Knowledge Quiz

Stephenson secured their second House General Knowledge Quiz title in a row, building up a commanding lead in the annual house competition as a result. An average score per pupil of 149.5 was the highest for quite some time and, with the likes of Takashi Yamaguchi (3B, Stephenson) scoring 235 and Thomas Ferguson (6G, Stephenson) scoring 255 out of a possible 300, there was little doubt who would win overall. The highest individual score came from Marawan Saad (6H, Arkwright), who scored an incredible 260, but with the results averaged out, his house had to settle for 2nd with 135.0.

Brunel came third with an average score of 127.8, with Telford 4th with 126.4.
