ENRICHMENT LECTURES PROFESSOR ALEXANDER STASINSKI: 'THE SERIOUSNESS OF MATHEMATICAL JOKES'

Yesterday evening, forty keen mathematicians came to hear the University of Durham's Professor of Algebra, Alexander Stasinski talk about the seriousness of mathematical jokes, as part of the enrichment lecture series. I think the biggest joke was my own lack of mathematical knowledge, but even from the perspective of a 'layman' it was engaging, and professor Stasinski's passion was evident. He went on to explain how we can consider Grandi's series a mathematical joke due to the meaningless paradoxical qualities of it, but then went on to describe how

we can make it meaningful and serious. Discussions of the Riemann Hypothesis, representation Zeta groups, and infinite groups certainly made this a challenging lecture, however our students and pupils engaged well, rose to the challenge, asking some thought-provoking questions at the end. We are very grateful for Professor Stasinski giving up the time to come and talk to us.

Our next lecture in the series is from former pupil, Nina Herbert. Nina is an ocean conservationist working with the charity ORCA. Over the past few weeks, she has been on



expedition in Antarctica to further understand the changes taking place in the ecosystem, and looking at ways to protect it. It is on this theme that she will talk to us. This will take place on Monday 6th February at 4:15pm in the Friarage Theatre.

DEBATE: IS MATHS THE MOST IMPORTANT SUBJECT?

This week in senior debate, we were joined by the first year debaters to explore a current hot topic through the motion of "This house believes maths is the most important subject.". With Rishi as chair and student judges Josh, Eleanor and Miriam, the four teams were divided into opposition and proposition, with two debaters on each side.

Luke (Team Ultimate Shannerz) on the proposition, opened by setting out his team's argument emphasising the use of maths through everyday activity and as a fundamental building block of real life with links to discipline. He also described maths as a universal language which is a well respected subject to the extent that everyone has an expectation to have some knowledge of it.

Opening for the opposition, Manisha (Team Agree to Disagree) focused on the importance of other subjects when it comes to everyday opportunities as well as highlighting how the existence of maths would have only come around with the subject of English and languages. She also gave further insight into how

learning difficulties affect people's mathematical abilities and the growing movement away from mathematics when it comes to higher education choices.

Closing for the proposition, Kitty (Team Arguably the best) explained how despite the difficulty some may face when learning mathematics, it does not decrease its importance. She further explored the use of maths in other subjects such as music, ethics and philosophy even alluding to the recent government proposal of making maths mandatory up until the age of 18, conveying its importance.

Simmi (Team Vici) then closed for the opposition highlighting the lack of importance maths had in the history of education and the modern world that is more dependent on technology to solve mathematical issues in the real world. She further emphasised the importance of individuality in the world and conveyed her team's belief that there is no most important subject, and that therefore maths could not be seen as the most important.

Both Teams then faced a series of questions from the judges and then the audience. The questions ranged from higher level maths being useless, the role of maths in medicine, maths as a necessity and technology like card machines calculating for us in the real world.

The judges then departed to collate ideas before choosing a winning side. On returning, they expressed how entertaining they found the debate with strong arguments and well answered questions before concluding that the proposition took the victory due to the clarity and consistency of their argument. Another great debate, shared with our younger debaters too!





NOTRE VOYAGE À BERNAY

Avant Noël, les lycéens de Yarm qui étudient le français sont allés en France pour visiter un lycée à Bernay. Malgré le temps glacial de la Normandie en hiver, on a apprécié l'expérience de parler français pendant le séjour entier et aussi de se faire des amis français.



DODDIE AID



POLITICS BOOK REVIEW: WHO RULES THE WORLD? BY NOAM CHOMSKY



Noam Chomsky presents a different answer than one might expect in his book Who Rules the World? which provides an interesting read. I originally chose to read Who Rules The World? because it linked nicely to our present Global Politics studies in Politics where we have discussed US power: the Cold War balance of power between the US and the USSR, the post-Cold War power of the US as the hegemony and the potential for a more distributed balance of power throughout the world. The rise of culture and arts from other countries such as China and South Korea have posed a threat to US power hence the extent of how much power the US really holds was on the forefront of my mind when choosing a book.

In his book, Chomsky reviews the current state (published 2017) of world affairs through a critical lens, analysing the US' (and other Western powers') role in shaping the wider world and its post-9/11 policies. He focuses a portion of his book on the

extent that the US have drifted from their human-rights focused policies as a result of the shift to military priorities which has led to a more frequent use of torture and elimination of perceived threats which I found most interesting to read. Chomsky uses the reported 'iust and necessary' murder of leader of Al Qaeda Osama Bin Laden whose body was 'dumped at sea without an autopsy [or] trial, as there was in the case of Nazi war criminals' as an example of this. He also explores three categories of murder: 'murder with intent', 'accidental murder' and 'murder with foreknowledge but without specific intent'. More often than not, the US falls into the third category: 'killing without intent' yet being aware of the potential for catastrophe. Such as when Bill Clinton ordered the bombing of the al-Shifa plant in 1998, despite the Human Rights Watch's advice, or the assassination of Al-Musawi and consequently his wife and five-year-old child by Israel with a US-supplied helicopter. The prioritising of eliminating perceived threats has caused the US to sacrifice those who were not so and Noam Chomsky uses the analogy of 'the ants we crush while walking down the street' to describe how the US perceives those civilians killed during their campaigns: the idea that we do not intend to crush the ants we walk over, although we are aware that it

will happen, but they are 'not worthy of such consideration' that we will consciously avoid crushing them. Chomsky explains that despite the US presenting itself as if it holds the moral high ground and its public support of human rights, when it deems appropriate, it does not mind deviating from the values it was built on. As Chomsky stated, it makes us wonder about 'which criminals "wanted the world over" and I personally found myself thinking about the self-interested actions of nation-states that were operating at the expense of others.

Chomsky holds little back when critically delving into US foreign policy and their military adventures which ignore international standards of human rights and cause hundreds of reckless deaths of noncombatants in the US 'War against Terror'. It almost feels ironic that to us the US seems to be the symbol of human rights, preaching to developing countries to change their own internal laws to adhere to the US and Western idea of human rights while behind the scenes they're putting into action a much grimmer policies that fundamentally goes against the international standards of human rights. Chomsky doesn't avoid controversial events to make his point through exploring the US torture memos and the dangers that nuclear weapons presents to the world and the idea that the US, today,

'entitled' the US to be able to resort to the 'unilateral use of military power' if deemed necessary.

Overall, Who Rules The World? was an insightful read and I would recommend it to anyone wishing to learn more about global politics and the US role in the world. Chomsky portrays the grilling truth of the reality of the US and what occurs behind the scenes of one of the biggest superpowers in the world which leads to an interesting, albeit slightly shocking, read and leads us to wonder not just 'who rules the world?' but 'what values rule the world?'.

The show explores such topics as; the first time we fall in love, leave home or achieve something important in our lives and received 5 star reviews and a standing ovation at the Edinburgh Festival.





12 Top Tips for BUILDING CYBER RESILIENCE AT HOME

As a society, we're increasingly using technology and tech services in the home. Digital assistants which can adjust the heating or turn lights on and off; streaming services for shows and movies on demand; games consoles; smart speakers; phones; laptops ... the list goes on. As we introduce each new gizmo to our homes, however, we increase the level of threat from cyber criminals. It's essential, therefore, that we learn to become more cyber resilient in relation to the devices and digital services that the people in our household use.

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WHAT IS 'CYBER RESILIENCE?'

Cyber resilience focuses on three key areas: reducing the **likelihood** of a cyber attack gaining access to our accounts, devices or data; reducing the potential **impact** of a cyber incident; and making the **recovery** from a cyber attack easier, should we ever fall victim to one.

1. PASSWORDS: LONGER AND LESS PREDICTABLE

The longer, less common and predictable a password is, the more difficult it becomes for cyber criminals to crack. The National Cyber Security Centre's 'three random words' guidelines are ideal for creating a long password which is easy to remember but hard to guess.

2. AVOID RE-USING PASSWORDS

When you use the same password across different logins, your cyber resilience is only as strong as the security of the weakest site or service you've signed up for. If cyber criminals gain access your username and password for one site or service, they'll definitely try them on others.

3. USE A PASSWORD MANAGER

A good way to juggle different passwords for every site or service you use is to have a password manager. This software stores all your passwords for you, so you simply need to remember the master password. LastPoss, Dashlane, IPassword and Keeper are all excellent password managers.

4. BACK UP YOUR DATA

Keep a copy of your data using OneDrive, Google Drive or another reputable cloud-based storage solution. If it's extremely important or sensitive information, you could even decide to keep more than one back-up version – by saving it to a removable USB drive or similar device, for example.

5. ENABLE MULTI-FACTOR AUTHENTICATION (MFA)

Multi-factor authentication is where you need access to your phone (to receive a code, for example) or another source to confirm your identity. This makes it far more difficult for cyber criminals to gain entry to your accounts and your data, even if they do manage to get your username and password.

6. CHOOSE RECOVERY QUESTIONS WISELY

Some services let you set 'recovery questions' – such as your birthplace or a pet's name – in case you forget your password. Take care not to use information you might have mentioned (or are likely to in future) on social media. More unpredictable answers make cyber criminals' task far harder.

7. SET UP SECONDARY ACCOUNTS

Some services provide the facility to add secondary accounts, phone numbers and so on to help with potentially recovering your account. Make sure you set these up: they will be vital if you're having trouble logging in or if you're trying to take back control of your account after a cyber attack.

12. STAY SCEPTICAL

Cyber criminals commonly use various methods, including emails, text messages and social media posts. Be cautious of any messages or posts that are out of the ordinary, offer something too good to be true or emphasise urgency – even if they appear to come from someone you know.

11. KEEP HOME

Download official software updates or your household's mobile phones, aptops, consoles and other not make the provided devices regularly, security improvements and fixes are a key feature of these updates – so by ensuring each device is running the latest version, you're making

10. CHANGE DEFAULT IOT PASSWORDS —

Devices from the 'Internet of Things' (167), such as 'smart' home appliances, are often supplied with default passwords. This makes them quicker to set up, but also less secure – criminals can identify these standard passwords more easily, so change them on your iot devices as sean as possible.

9. CHECK FOR BREACHES

You can check if your personal information has been involved in any known data breaches by entering your email address at www.havelbeenpwned.com (yes, that spelling is correct!). It's useful if you're worried about a possible attack – or simply as motivation to review your account security.

8. KEEP HAVING FUN WITH TECH
