
The newsletter contains information about the forthcoming Careers

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY POLITICS STUDENT ATTEND HISTORY OF FEMINISM LECTURE

a number of the Upper Sixth Politics students travelled to Newcastle for an evening lecture delivered by Dr Hannah Dawson, a historian of ideas at King's College London. She received her PhD in history from the University of Cambridge, and is the author of books on Hobbes and Locke. Amongst other publications and research Dr Dawson is the editor of The Penguin Book of Feminist Writing, a fascinating compendium of extracts of feminist writing from the 15th century to the present day.

Beginning the journey from Christine de Pisan's City of Ladies (1405) and voyaging through to the complexities and controversies of twenty-first century feminist thinking, Dr Dawson presented the ideology as quite simply 'a movement to end sexism'. As such it is arguably better to think of feminism as being against inequality, rather than a demanding to-do list of compliance and expectation. The Cabinet minister who recently proclaimed: 'I am not a feminist, I believe in equality for all', had missed the point. Dr Dawson demonstrated feminism operating against other actions, such as John Knox's book The First Blast of the Trumpet against the Monstrous Regiment of Women (1588). De Pisan indulged in a reimagining of a new city made of the overlooked women of the past - it was a cry for

education and engagement. There were insightful sharing from Mary Wollsteoncraft's works concerned with the cultivation of women's minds, referencing 'beauty as women's sceptre...the adornment of a prison'. And then on to Virginia Woolf, who in her Professions of Women, a precursor to Three Guineas talked of the need to 'kill the angel in the house', the angel being that apologetic, ever-pleasing daemon that plagues the conscience of women. Powerfully evoking de Beauvoir in a series of her writings, Dr Dawson connected current debates around trans issues with the French writer's statements that gender is a construction - 'one if not born but becomes a woman' - and in this woman becomes a fiction or fabrication. If they are made they can be remade, and biology is not destiny. Dr Dawson argued that economics and labour were a consistent thread through the history of feminist writing, but was brave enough to acknowledge some of the slips or transgressions, even exclusions of feminism, in the 1960s this being issues of women of colour, non-European, working class, etc and again back to the trans debate of our time. Sojourner Truth, the American abolitionist born into slavery asked in 1851 'Aren't I a woman?' In 'leaning in' bell hooks warned us to make sure we do not 'lean on', that we rethink the gatekeepers, and reassess the concepts. Feminism has so consistently sought to throw off the rigid policing of gender, and that again remains the challenge.

PUBLIC LAWYER FORMER PUPIL SPEAKS OF HIS WORK ON THE **IMMIGRATION BILL**

conversation with Phil Armitage, who a criminal defence capacity focusing left us in 2010 and has since been building an impressive career and reputation as a public and administrative lawyer. When he spoke to the Politics Society and prospective law applicants on Friday he had just finished submitting his report to Members of Parliament ahead of the vote on the new Immigration Bill this week.

Phil works at JUSTICE, a law-based charity, pressure group and think tank based in London, an organisation with a commitment to the protection of human rights and the rule of law. Prior to this Phil completed a degree in Politics and Philosophy at the University of Sheffield, followed by a law conversation or GDL. He was called to the Bar in 2015 but switched tack and was guided by a raft of previous voluntary positions, including the likes of Liberty and Bail for

on Crown Court work. He has worked on a number of high profile public law challenges to immigration and detention policy, and he discussed for example, his successful litigation in the Court of Appeal over the Home Office removals policy, as well as his successful work over detention policy during the COVID pandemic.

As Phil gears up for another period of significant work in the face of proposed legislation, it was fascinating to catch up with him to learn more about the nature of the process of legal challenges, the extent to which consensual conversations can be developed, as well as the government perception of JUSTICE. Students were keen to ask questions on the recent Rwanda policy of the government and its likely trajectory, as well as Phil's assessment of current proposals in

Last week we were delighted to be in Immigration Detainees. He worked in terms of their legality and practicality in the face of ECHR commitments. It was intriguing as well as a privilege to listen to one so immersed in the current wrestles over the direction of public policy and wish Phil all the best in his ongoing efforts.

NETBALL


Congratulations to our U14 and U16 netball teams who competed in the England Netball National Schools Finals at Oundle School at the weekend.

Top Tips for Adopting SAFE & HEALTHY ONLINE HABITS

Everyone has so much going on in their lives, and that includes children: from exams and deadlines to anxiety and mental health struggles. It's quite easy to send memes, make jokes and vent online about the things that irritate us, but when was the last time you – or your child – took a moment to share something kind or positive instead? In fact, when did you last stop and think about your family's online activities? To help keep them safe and teach them healthy online habits, we need to develop our children's digital resilience. There are lots of ways that children can become more digitally resilient, and we've pulled together some popular strategies here ...

WHAT IS DIGITAL RESILIENCE?



Resilience doesn't mean being so tough that nothing gets to you, and it's not about "putting up with things" either. Instead, it's the ability to recover from setbacks. Everyone feels sad, worried, scared or upset at times: it's how we respond and adapt to those situations which is important. Digital resilience is about making choices that keep us safe and happy online, even when we're exposed to something negative or upsetting. Building your child's digital resilience will help reduce the impact of potential risks as they engage with and navigate around the online world.

MAKE POSITIVE LIFESTYLE CHOICES

- Make time for the people and things that make you happy.
- Monitor your screen time and stick to your limits.
- On social media, follow people that make you feel good about yourself – and unfollow the ones who don't.
- Spread some positivity: post good reviews, leave encouraging comments and share good news.

KEEP YOUR HEALTH IN MIND

- Try to factor in regular breaks offline and away from your screen – ideally, outdoors for some revitalising fresh air.
- Exercise is a brilliant stress-buster: even a walk around the block, a bike ride or a stroll to your local shop can really work wonders.
- Be strict with yourself about putting devices away in plenty of time before bed: they can interfere with a good night's sleep, which is essential for staying healthy.

REACH OUT FOR SUPPORT

- If you have a problem online, don't be afraid reach out to specialist people or organisations that could help.
- Follow people on socials who have the same values and morals as you.
- You could always talk to a friend, or a trusted adult like a teacher or family member for some advice.

PUT SAFETY FIRST



- If you see something online that upsets or worries you, tell a trusted adult about it as soon as possible.
- You could also report the content that's making you feel uncomfortable to the site or app that you saw it on, so they can look into it.
- Another option is to block the person or the account that's causing you a problem – or you could go one step further by totally deleting the app you were using.

GET THINGS CLEAR IN YOUR HEAD



- Ask yourself what kindness online actually looks like. Can you remember the last time someone was kind or supportive towards you online? What did they do?
- Think about how it makes you feel when someone sends you a positive or funny message online.
- What about the opposite: has someone ever been deliberately unkind to you online? What did they do and how did it make you feel?
- If someone's behaviour online is causing you stress, try to remind yourself of all the steps you can take if a person's being unkind online.
