NATIONAL READING CHAMPIONS QUIZ 2023

Shortly before the Easter break a team of First Year and a team of Second Year pupils competed against 24 other school teams in the north east regional heat of the National Reading Champions Quiz. The quiz, run by the National Literacy Trust, is now in its third year and is aimed at promoting reading enjoyment, encouraging diverse reading, and improving reading stamina. The questions cover multiple genres of fiction and include everything from Greek mythology to graphic novels and books adapted into Netflix series. Teams from 23 regions across the UK take part.

Whereas previous book quizzes we have participated in have involved an annual trip up to Newcastle in the minibus, the post-pandemic version entailed competing online in the comfort of our own school meeting room! Our teams faced seventy five questions over 8 rounds, each with a different theme – one of which included 'relatives in fiction' and another guessing the book from a number of short video clips acted out by the quiz master, Mr Dilly!


