'Dovecote', Yarm School's student magazine, was born out of the pandemic - a voice for the students during a time of isolation and uncertainty. In its second year, our students celebrated their regained independence and freedoms. Each year, the team has grown in knowledge, expertise and ambition, and this year was no exception.

Yarm School students have proudly been recognised by the National Shine School Media Awards for the past two years, and this week we received the news that we've hit the hat-trick with our third annual publication, 'Voice'. A group of high-profile industry professionals including Hugh Dickerson from Google, Liz Hunt from the Daily Mail, and Terry Mansfield CBE from Hearst have shortlisted three of our students for awards: Annabel Cochrane (left), Anna Page (middle), and Poppy Bell (right).

Annabel Cochrane has been shortlisted for 'Non-Fiction Writer of the Year' for her compelling article on the human rights crisis in Nicaragua. A special thanks goes to Mr. Edwards for helping Annabel to organise an interview with Abigail Hernandez, a journalist actively working on the front line amidst the atrocities. Annabel was honoured to be able to share Hernandez's voice as she valiantly fights for the voice of her nation.

Anna Page has been shortlisted for 'Fiction Writer of the Year' for her poem 'Inked'. Anna was in the student magazine's Editorial/Advisory Board and took part in a number of workshops that were organised by the Lead Editors, one of which focused on various means of freely expressing your identity. We considered what our identities meant, how we expressed them, apprehensions that we might have in certain situations, and societal expectations. We feel that Anna's poem (very!) cleverly and stylishly explores all of the above.

Poppy Bell has been shortlisted for 'Photographer of the Year'. Poppy is a keen photographer, and she really rose to the challenge of creating inspirational images for this year's edition of Dovecote. As she's not taking Art at GCSE, Poppy approached the Art Department at the start of the year to ask for help

with refining her skills. Under the expert guidance of Ms. Jenyns, Poppy's natural eye for a 'good shot' developed. Poppy has always found photography liberating and I hope that this validation of her talent means that she continues to pursue her passion.

Over 40 students have been involved with the production of the magazine this year, cultivating the engagement of their peers, Yarm School staff and the YSA. We're thoroughly grateful to all of those who have contributed, and made this year's magazine a success.

This year's publication, 'Voice', will be on sale in the Dovecote during lunchtime on Friday 16th June.

Copies of the magazine will be priced at £2 each. All profits made from this edition will be donated to 'The Junction Foundation', which seeks to work with disadvantaged children through a number of different projects across Tees Valley.


The National Shine School Media Awards will take place in London on Monday 3rd July - keep your fingers and toes crossed for our deserving (and talented!) students.

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#### LILIAN VISITS MCLAREN

Before the half term holidays, I was able to visit the McLaren Technology Centre alongside 30 other Arkwright Scholars to learn more about the roles of engineers in motorsports and specifically the roles of engineers at McLaren.

The visit started with a talk about early careers at McLaren and the various programmes that they offer which can help secure a career in motorsport engineering. We were then broken into smaller groups and visited the McLaren Shadow Studio (Esports) where we could drive around Silverstone on the simulators. We were able to get a tour of the



technology centre which included visiting both the Formula 1 factory and the road car factory. We could see the current chassis being worked on in preparation for the Imola Grand Prix. The Technology centre is lined with lots of old formula 1 cars and various road cars that McLaren have produced which was great to see. The visit ended with a talk by current McLaren engineers who spoke about



their roles and their routes into the industry.

Overall the visit was very valuable to learn about career paths and to receive some specific advice about universities and different opportunities.





## 10 top tips for safely using SMARTWATCHES

Kids love gadgets, and smartwatches – available to buy from as little as £20 online – make a tempting gift. As with any type of mobile technology, though, smartwatches can pose risks to children unless they're used safely. Receiving unwanted calls, cyber-stalking and distracting a young person when they're crossing the road are all known risks associated with smartwatches. However, these devices can bring plenty of benefits for children and parents alike – so let's examine the pros and cons of smartwatches.

#### AVOID CHEAP OPTIONS

A quick search online yields a torrent of cheap smartwatches for kids, costing as little as £20, It's wise to avoid this bargain basement tech: it tends to deliver a poor experience with inferior battery life, and It's hard to have faith in the software's safety. There have been cases of smartwatches being hacked to track or contact children; stick to known brands who have a reputation to protect.

#### **CONTROL CALLING**

Many smartwatches have the facility to make or take calls. As with a phone, you may want to restrict who your child can call – or be called by. On Apple Watches, you can select trusted contacts who are allowed to ring your child, while other watches' controls vary hugely. Some need to connect to a linked phone for calls, as you may be able to block unknown contacts via that device instead.

#### BEWARE HIDDEN COSTS

For a smartwatch to allow calls independently (that is, without being connected to a phone via Bluetooth) it will need its own mobile data plan. This might take the form of a tiny SIM card that you slot into the watch – or an eSIM, where the physical card is replaced by software settings. Either way, this will incur an additional monthly cost that you'll need to factor into any buying decision.

### ENABLE FAMILY SHARING

Apple Watches aren't cheap, but they do affer super's safety features — allowing parents to control calls, messages and emails on the device, as well as a location tracking system that can send alerts if kids wander beyond pre-set boundaries. Their SOS function enables children to contact emergency services instantly if they're in trouble, which simultaneously also alerts parents and carers.

#### TRACK ITS LOCATION

Both Apple and Android devices have apps which allow you to track a smartwatch's location. They can also initiate an audio alert – avoiding those cushion-hurling panics when a treasured device can't be found at home. If you're planning to track your child's location via their watch, make them aware of that in advance. You could even make it a condition of them cetting the watch in the first place.

#### THINK 'SAFFTY FIRST'

Smartwatches are often worth hundreds of pounds, which can make young people wearing one a target for thieves. Advise your child to keep the watch hidden in public (when possible) and not to resist if muggers demand their watch, if you manage to track a stolen device, pass that information to the police: location data isn't always accurate, so you could end up wrongly accusing someone.

#### STORE MEDICAL INFO

Devices including the Samsung Galaxy Watch and Apple Watch can store the owner's medical details (such as their blood group and any pre-existing medical conditions), potentially giving emergency services access to vital information in a crisis. These devices also have frand fall' detection, which sends a text message to selected contacts along with a map showing the wearer's location.

#### USE THEM AS MOTIVATION

#### MAKE THEM COOL FOR SCHOOL

Some schools have banned smartwatches, as pupils have been using them as substitute phones. If your child's school does permit them, some devices can be set to prevent distractions in class. For example, Apple's Schooltime feature turns their watches into ordinary time-keeping devices during school hours. #### BE MINDFUL OF BEDTIME

Many smartwatches offer sleep tracking, which some (usually older) children use to justify wearing them to bed. However, that also presents a temptation to message friends or check social media late at night, even if their phone is downstairs. Unless there's a valid reason not to, you could encourage your child to remove the watch in the evenings and ensure the charger stays in a different room.
