QUAKER EDUCATION CONFERENCE



Last Saturday, we had the wonderful opportunity to go with Dr Goodall and represent Yarm at the Quaker Education Conference, which was held at Bootham School in York. The main aim of the day was, together with 120 other students from across the world (including from as far away as India), to produce a youth education manifesto that would be presented to education experts and policymakers at the Radix Big Tent Ideas Festival this weekend (17th June). The day consisted of listening to six incredible speakers as well as time to discuss our ideas and develop our manifesto in the sub-groups that we were assigned. Some of the speakers included Body Image and Mental Health campaigner, Natasha Devon, Senior Fellow at the Institute for Government, Sam Freidman, and Ruth Ibegbuna, the founder of the working class student activism charity RECLAIM. All of the speakers

were extremely knowledgeable and engaging. The speeches covered a range of topics such as: manifesto writing and lobbying practices as well as speaking about their personal experiences in educational policy and shared with us ideas of what can be done or changed and how their work tries to achieve change in the education sector. All the speakers emphasised the notion of community and how we can use education as a

tool to provide knowledge to not only better ourselves, but allow us to bring positive change to the community around us. The combination of the fascinating speakers and the opportunity to meet and discuss ideas with people from around the world, meant that it was a conference rich with culture. INTER SCHOOL HISTORY DEBATE VS CONYERS 'THIS HOUSE BELIEVES THAT 'COMMUNISM AS A POLITICAL IDEOLOGY CAN NEVER WORK IN PRACTICE'



On Tuesday, A Level History students welcomed Convers School for an inter-school History debate on communism. The motion being, 'This house believes that communism as a political ideology can never work in practice.' Students at both Yarm and Conyers study the application of communism as part of their A Level curriculum, with Yarm focusing on the transformation of China from 1936 to 1997, and Convers studying the imposition of communism in the Soviet Union. Yarm's team was made up of Jacob Rutter, Charlotte Sowerby, and Morven Hawthorne.

Yarm, as the home side, proposed the motion, and we heard first from Jacob. He carefully defined communism as 'a far-left wing sociopolitical, philosophical, and economic ideology, centered around common ownership, distribution, and exchange that allocates products to everyone in the society based on need.' Jacob argued in depth that it is unrealistic to suggest a society can function with all its members providing labour that does not directly benefit them. He also

pointed out that a tendency to exploit certain groups for labour, a tactic most noticeably used by Stalin and Mao.

perhaps the two most prevalent communist leaders.

Grace from Convers then replied and argued that communism has led to significant advancements in science, technology, and medical care. She acknowledged that communism has, at times, failed due to leaders being overly powerful. Using Cuba as an example of a country where society has been transformed by the imposition of communist ideology and as a country where citizens were valued equally.

Charlotte rebutted some of the claims made by Convers and cited examples, particularly from rural China, where the economic imposition of communism had led to the greatest man-made famine the world has ever seen from 1958 to 1961. Charlotte also cited the argument that communism requires a strong central authority which, in practice, led to authoritarian regimes that have stifled opposition and dissent, and led to the emergence of dictators such as Stalin, Mao, and the Kim dynasty.

Kiera from Conyers looked at the use communist states have of communism to alleviate social inequality in society. Again using China as an example, she looked at the number of people that China had lifted out of extreme poverty, and how in Cuba, education had been used effectively. For example, Cuba has the highest patient-to-doctor ratio in the world and literacy rates of 99.8%. Additionally, Kiera pointed out how communist countries had been able to avoid the 'boom and bust' economics of capitalist countries, for example, during the Great Depression of the 1930s.

> Morven picked up on a number of points made by the Conyers team and rebutted them. Particularly, she cited that in Cuba, the average wage was just \$87 a month. Morven pointed to the argument that communist governments have always had to fight against mass emigration of their citizens who were desperate to escape the authoritarianism and censorship of the state. Morven made a very clear and persuasive judgement that 'history proves communism to be a grossly impractical ideology. It has proven to be a breeding ground for irreplaceable dictators, famine, and fear. Not only does it fail, but it reverts back to what Marx created in opposition to—capitalism as a remedy.'

Finally, Matthew from Conyers identified the argument that Marx's ideology of communism has never been fully implemented, and therefore, it is very difficult to agree with the motion that it can never work in practice. Leninism, Stalinism, and Maoism, rather than being Marxist, have deviated from the designed ideology in reality. Matthew spoke about the desirable parts of communism: equality, human advancement, and increased prosperity, and pointed to the fact

that these could work in the future.

We then had some questioning from our judges, which was dealt with well by both sides, before further questioning from an inquisitive audience. At this point, the judges left the room to confer, and an audience vote was taken. The majority agreed with the motion at the start of the debate; however, some had changed their minds by the end of the debate.

Finally, after some tension had built,

we received the judges' verdict. They gave feedback that the quality and standard of the debate were extremely high from both sides, and it was a very enjoyable debate with very well-presented arguments. The verdict was a Yarm victory, albeit against a very strong opposition. Well done to all debaters from both sides, and thanks to Mr Bridges for chairing, and Mrs Pinkham and Mr Grimwood for judging. A return fixture will be organised.



What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

Money muling involves individuals—very frequently young people—being recruited to transfer illegally obtained funds into and out of their bank account on behalf of criminals (often without even realising that is the kind of activity they ve become embroiled in), and usually being allowed to keep a certain amount for themselves. It is essentially a digital form of money laundering. This guide highlights some of the risks associated with money muling, and provides parents and carers with useful tips to help safeguard young people against becoming ensured by this growing online hazard.
