Perhaps the modern competition is a gesture to those worthy pupils of times past as the Sixth Form representatives of Aidan, Bede. Cuthbert and Oswald rise to this annual challenge.

Thanks are due, once again, to Mrs Smith, Mr Matthewman and the Sodexo team for providing a splendid pre-match barbecue enjoyed by students and staff in the dining hall and sixth form area.

In the first round, perennial Tug
O'War heavyweights Aidan faced a
disciplined Bede outfit who were
looking well drilled by House
supremo Mr Lyle. Bede made short
work of pulling Aidan up and down
hill to emerge comfortable winners
two to nil. Oswald and Cuthbert

then looked like a more closely matched tie with Mr Alexander's lighter yet spirited team digging in for a resolute defence. Dr Craig's Oswald, however, ultimately proved too strong for them and emerged undefeated winners to progress to the final.

Bede and reigning champions
Oswald looked like setting up a well
balanced final with initial signs
looking like floodlights might be
required as both sides refused to
give ground. Bede, already well
rested after their victory over Aidan,
looked the favourites going into the
match but Oswald's disciplined
power was just too much to resist
and Oswald once again emerged
worthy winners by two pulls to nil.
Oswald are building a strong Tug
O'War reputation: now three years
without losing a single pull.

In the entire modern history of the competition, Upper Sixth have never once defeated their younger counterparts yet it seemed all that was about to change. A very evenly matched contest really did look set to do some damage to the Rope, yet, despite the downhill advantage, their experience and the help of some guests, Upper Sixth could still not hold on and Lower Sixth yet again emerged victorious, maintaining their 45 year unbeaten record.

It was good to see so many students at the barbeque and taking part so

enthusiastically in the Tug O'War. I hope everyone has enjoyed their first few days of Sixth Form and I wish the students every success as they settle into the new academic year.

## **ENRICHMENT LECTURE SERIES**

From talks on how vaccines are produced on an industrial scale, raising capital in a modern business, to Antarctic expeditions and circular plastic recycling, the lectures have been varied, informative and highly engaging. They have attracted a wide variety of staff and pupils of all different ages, leading to some very stimulating Q&A sessions at the end.

He will be talking about weird and wonderful bacteria and his current research on antibacterial agents that target metals.
Monday 9th October 16:15 - Friarage Theatre	Bola Ajekigbe: Robotics in Surgery  Bola Ajekigbe is a surgeon (registrar) currently undertaking a research PhD in robotics in surgery. He will be talking about trauma and orthopaedics in addition to his research into robotics.
Tues 21st November 16:15 - Friarage Theatre	Alex Bridges: Archaeology 101 Former pupil, Alex Bridges will be giving an introduction to archaeology, dispelling some of the myths from TV/film, and providing an insight into his current area of research.

## WORK EXPERIENCE WITH THE WILLIAMS RACING TEAM

The summer holidays is often an ideal time to undertake some work experience, and a good number of the senior students set time aside for this. Sometimes it can simply be about exploring a curiosity in a particular field - what does a law firm actually feel like? - whilst for others it's the time to secure vital work experience necessary for the next stage of education and training. Over the next few weeks we will share some stories of work experience from senior students.

Lilian Dufton, who has just completed her A Levels and is off to study Engineering at university, tells us here about a fascinating week she spent at the Williams Racing Team!

Over the summer holidays I was able to complete a week's worth of work experience at Williams Racing. The week gave me an insight into almost all of the departments within the Formula 1 team. I completed many different activities including a tour of the wind tunnel and seeing next year's car being worked on, manufacturing a model steering wheel, seeing the simulator, walking around all parts of the factory and completing races on the esports simulators.

I was able to see parts being manufactured that were then flown out and used at the next race. The week showed how fast paced the industry is and how a part can be manufactured in such a short period of time.

I am going to be studying engineering at university so it was also interesting to hear from other departments such as procurement and finance. With the cost cap being a recent addition into Formula 1, and Williams being one of the main drivers for this to be put into place, it was especially interesting to hear about the topic from their point of view.

Applications for this experience often open again in the new year and I would recommend that anyone interested applies. I was lucky to be selected from over 2000 applicants, but even the application process was good in mimicking a job application.


