scientists had completed a selection process in school and they had also submitted a preliminary quiz which would also contribute to their overall ranking.

After lunch at the University the students completed four different rounds testing their chemical knowledge. The first two rounds saw the students complete Kahoot quizzes against the other competitors. The final two rounds involved a research task and an exercise processing and analysing experimental data.

The students performed extremely well and were only outside the top three in one of the five rounds. This meant that for the second year running Yarm have been crowned regional champions and will be invited to the national finals in the spring term.

Just as the festive spirit brings excitement this December, our Eco-Schools committee would like to remind everyone how we can make this Christmas environmentally friendly!

For starters, let's think about Christmas trees. Every Christmas, 120 million trees are cut down as part of our decorations. This results in huge amounts of greenhouse gases being emitted. A 6ft artificial tree has a carbon footprint equivalent to about 40 kg of greenhouse gas emissions which is more than twice that of a real tree. Plastic trees only

have less of an environmental impact if used 10 times or more compared to a real tree being used. So what Christmas

tree would be more eco-friendly? Consider getting a potted Christmas tree or renting one. If you still get a tree, make sure it comes with a stamp from the British Tree Growers' Association.

Another way to celebrate a green Christmas is to ensure that your decorations are eco friendly. The best thing to do is to reuse old Christmas decorations that are difficult to recycle. When in need of new decorations, try to replace them with paper ones: you could even try to make your own. Show off your crochet or origami skills! Another staggering fact about Christmas is how much food is wasted from mince pies to brussel sprouts. It is estimated that we waste an equivalent 4.2 million Christmas dinners which would cost around £64 million. To reduce this try to cook for appropriate portion sizes and try to eat any leftovers!

We hope that this guide has been informative to help you consider your impact on our environment when you celebrate Christmas this year with your family and friends! Don't forget about our crisp packet collection points around school to start with your good deeds for this season! Merry Christmas!

POLITICS STUDENTS MEET WITH STOCKTON WEST CANDIDATE

With little certainty and much speculation over the date of the next General Election the Politics Society invited the Labour Party candidate for Stockton South to speak to the students. The current school constituency of Stockton South will transform at the next election to Stockton West, given the shift in boundaries by the Electoral Commission to reflect recent population shifts. Our guest. Joe Dancey, will contest this seat against the Conservative Party's Matt Vickers MP, and other yet to declare candidates from other parties.

Joe Dancey grew up in this area, having attended Egglescliffe School before going up to Oxford to read PPE. After a brief stint in the Civil Service Joe worked in the House of Lords with Baroness Amos, a period that was followed by working for some time with Lord Coe, the former Olympian and Conservative Peer, as they crafted the 2012 London Olympics. Joe has been back living and working in the constituency for the last five years or so.

Our guest talked refreshingly over the need for greater political consensus and a shift away from overly partisan, binary politics. He carries a significant interest and experience in the field of trade and industry, keen to develop greater, more prosperous partnerships for the Teesside region. Students explored a diverse range of questions in what proved to be a most interesting and agreeable exchange of ideas and opinions.

MMIS FOR THE MDVS

Last week saw the successful completion of this year's Mock MMIs (Multiple Mini Interviews). This is a common form of interviewing for applicants of Medicine, Dentistry and Veterinary Science, and is increasingly being used further afield. It is a shorter, pacier form of interviewing that more conventional one-on-one or panel type arrangements and is often compared by some to 'speed dating'. The arrangement consists of a number of stations designed to test key skills, attributes and knowledge in the form of very short interviews.

To assist Yarm School applicants in these areas and this format, for a couple of years now we have offered a mock version of this process. Mr Newman, who has responsibility for Health Professions applicants has a carefully constructed programme that replicates the 'official' experience to an excellent degree.

Nineteen students, including a number of applicants from Egglescliffe School, experienced ten different stations during these interviews with members of staff. The focus of the interviews included the topics of ethics, teamwork, NHS values, communication, integrity, critical thinking, resilience and calculations. The rapid fire nature of the process requires considerable mental agility, for which the students had been preparing for this event beforehand, not least through the MedSoc activity. Mr Newman has already in the aftermath found time to debrief to individuals and to the group as a whole. Our appreciation is also extended to the group of Yarm School staff who gave generously of their experience and expertise, as well as a couple of hours of their evening in order to interview the students. As someone who is frequently pulling together resources to organise such events, I can appreciate the time and effort required to realise such an invaluable experience. Mr Newman with his characteristic professionalism, commitment to precision and the delivery of a high quality experience, ensured that the students received the very best preparation, as well as

presenting as a role model for the high standards required within the health professions. It was immediately obvious to the students themselves that they had been put through a demanding, exacting and authentic round of interviews, that will certainly stand them in good stead in their applications, for which we wish them all the very best in the weeks ahead.

FOURTH YEAR PUPILS ATTEND HEALTH PROFESSIONS WORKSHOP AT JAMES COOK

As the term begins to draw to a close nineteen members of the Fourth Year opted to spend their Saturday morning gaining greater insight into possible future careers within medicine.

The annual event was hosted by the Strive Centre at the James Cook University Hospital. The centre is the venue for the training of a vast range of medics and dentists from across the region, including students from the York-Hull and Newcastle Medical Schools. On hand to assist the pupils was a diverse range of medical practitioners who were able to take the students in small groups through a series of workshops. These included the likes of obstetrics and gynaecology where pupils learned on a simulated model the process of delivering a baby, and a workshop centred around keyhole surgery training skills involved a gastric surgeon. Other students learned more about cardiology with video and mannequin simulations, whilst others took their turn learning to insert cannulas into a model of an arm, albeit complete with a blood supply to more fully replicate the real experience.

It proved to be a fascinating morning for so many pupils, gaining their first hands-on experiences as they begin to consider their future options, and whether their skills and temperament could benefit this diverse profession field. We are most appreciative of the time and efforts of all of the staff at the Strive Centre and James Cook for facilitating this wonderful visit.

BOYS' INDOOR HOCKEY

Whilst the boys have played a number of outdoor fixtures this term the focus has been on the indoor version of the game. It was pleasing to report that we beat all of the regional opposition as we were crowned champions at the Under 14, Under 16 and Under 18 age groups.

The Under 12s travelled to Manchester for the North Finals and eventually finished 4th after tight one goal defeat in the semi-finals and 3/4th place play off. Unfortunately, the U14s didn't make the tournament in Manchester as they got stuck behind a crash on the A19- they will play a rearranged game against eventual winners King's Chester in the New Year.

The Under 16's and 18s played out their National Final tournaments in London last week and although both teams might have been disappointed with their final placings, one could not fault their commitment and attitude throughout.

The Under 16s lost their first 2 games to eventual finalists St George's 4-1 and Repton 4-1. Considering both schools are attached to top clubs and in Repton's case recruit England players and German internationals, the score lines were very respectable. The only disappointing result came in our last group game against Southampton where a poor start saw us fall behind and we never recovered. The boys did save their best hockey for the final 7/8th place play off game against Katharine Lady Berkeley's School. We went 3 goals ahead before eventually drawing 4-4 to claim joint 7th place.

The Under 18 tournament was very frustrating. The boys looked amazing against Ipswich and quickly went 2-0 before the game unravelled due to some ill discipline and what can only be described as a tough to take umpiring decisions that led to us losing the game 3-2. We dominated Southampton (who boasted 3 England Internationals) but somehow lost the game 2-1 before comfortably beating Dean Close to finish 3rd in the group. Everyone agreed that we should have topped the group and could have had a crack at Whitgift or Repton but this was not to be.

We made many changes in the last game and eventually ran out as the 6th best team in the country- the vast majority of this squad will still be at the school next year so it is hoped we can be more successful then.
