POLITICS SOCIETY - ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE



Friday lunchtime brought the third in the recent series of human rights defenders to speak with members of the Politics Society. Our guest this week was Marilou, a long established and much recognised figure within the Philippines for her work on environmental justice. Interestingly Marilou trained and continues to work as an accountant, and it was whilst on an earlier job assignment in Brunei that she was called in to assist a case of human exploitation of domestic workers. The case involving the royal family was subsequently brought to trial leading to a landmark victory.

These days Marilou focuses her attention on the impact of aggressive mining practices in a landscape otherwise known for its staggering natural beauty. In a series of maps we saw the scale of the mining endeavours, alongside photographs of the impact of huge open cast

mining. Marilou then demonstrated the disproportionately modest and limited impact that this was having on the Philippines economy in general, besides the fact that the mining was failing to ease the poverty of the areas in which it occurred. In fact through pollution, top soil removal and the contamination of water courses, it was having hugely negative impacts on those communities.

Marilou is unusual as a campaigner in that she works very much at a grassroots level, organising community projects and workshops, as well as doing awareness raising projects throughout the country, but she also focuses her time and attention on the decision-makers in government. She has met and negotiated with several former presidents and is currently spearheading the drafting and hopeful implementation of a new

mining bill that will be presented to congress upon her return. That return, and Marilou's eagerness to return to campaigning, following a spell of research, is naturally tempered by the risks she will continue to face in her country. She lives in a safe house, the sad reality of a country that is one of the world's most dangerous countries for environmental activists, who all too often pay the ultimate price for their efforts to build a better world. It was a hugely illuminating session, shining a light on an issue about which many of us had little previous knowledge.


the decision making of firms who ultimately seek to secure profits.



HOUSE DEBATE FINAL

On Friday the 9th, Oswald and Aidan competed in the final of the annual House Debate competition In front of the Sixth Form audience. The motion was "This house would require compulsory military service" with Aidan arguing for the motion and Oswald arguing against it. The debate was opened by chair Erin Scott who introduced the two sides: Kayla Roberts, Sara Banerjee and Simone Sharma for Aidan, and Manisha Shyam, Miriam Akowuah and James Waine for Oswald.

The debate was opened by Kayla who established a clear definition of compulsory military service and talked about the benefits of this requirement to the individual, such as personal skills development and allowing everyone the opportunity to gain employment skills, regardless of background. Following this, Manisha opened for Oswald, countering Kayla's arguments by exploring the negative impacts of compulsory military conscription on an individual, including mental health risks and an

infringement on one's human rights. Sara delved into the potential impacts on society including greater social cohesion and improved national security. Next up for Oswald was Miriam who discussed the effects of compulsory military service on the army. This included lowering morale and quality within the army and leading to a less modernised defence sector. Simone gave Aidan's closing argument while also accepting and rebutting a number of points of information from the opposition during her speech in a calm and collected manner. Finally James closed for Oswald, passionately arguing for the negative economic effects of compulsory military service and its political disadvantages.

Following this, both teams were posed a series of questions by the judging panel which consisted of Dr Williams, Mr Bridges and Mrs McLean. The judges complemented both teams on their answers to questions with developed responses

from all team members. This concluded the debate and the judges deliberated the results while both audience and debates waited anxiously. In the end, winning both the audience and judges vote,

Oswald prevailed victorious - for the second year in a row!

Congratulations to all who participated for what was described as a very close and entertaining debate, and a big thank you to the chair, Erin, and the judges.

12 Top Tips for DING CYBER

As a society, we're increasingly using technology and tech services in the home. Digital assistants which can adjust the heating or turn lights on and off; streaming services for shows and movies on demand; games consoles; smart speakers; phones; laptops ... the list goes on. As we introduce each new gizmo to our homes, however, we increase the level of threat from cyber criminals. It's essential, therefore, that we learn to become more cyber resilient in relation to the devices and digital services that the people in our household use.

WHAT IS 'CYBER RESILIENCE?'

Cyber resilience focuses on three key areas: reducing the **likelihood** of a cyber attack gaining access to our accounts, devices or data; reducing the potential **impact** of a cyber incident; and making the **recovery** from a cyber attack easier, should we ever fall victim to one.

1. PASSWORDS: LONGER AND LESS PREDICTABLE

The longer, less common and predictable a password is, the more difficult it becomes for cyber criminals to crack. The National Cyber Security Centre's 'three random words' guidelines are ideal for creating a long password which is easy to remember but hard to guess. OSCAR123

2. AVOID RE-USING PASSWORDS

When you use the same password across different logins, your cyber resilience is only as strong as the security of the weakest site or service you've signed up for. If cyber criminals gain access your username and password for one site or service, they'll definitely try them on others.

3. USE A PASSWORD MANAGER

A good way to juggle different passwords for every site or service you use is to have a password manager. This software stores all your passwords for you, so you simply need to remember the master password. LastPass, Dashlane, lPassword and Keeper are all excellent password managers.

4. BACK UP YOUR DATA

Keep a copy of your data using OneDrive, Google Drive or another reputable cloud-based storage solution. If it's extremely important or sensitive information, you could even decide to keep more than one back-up version – by saving it to a removable USB drive or similar device, for example.

5. ENABLE MULTI-FACTOR AUTHENTICATION (MFA)

Multi-factor authentication is where you need access to your phone (to receive a code, for example) or another source to confirm your identity. This makes it far more difficult for cyber criminals to gain entry to your accounts and your data, even if they do manage to get your username and password.

6. CHOOSE RECOVERY QUESTIONS WISELY

Some services let you set 'recovery questions' – such as your birthplace or a pet's name – in case you forget your password. Take care not to use information you might have mentioned (or are likely to in future) on social media. More unpredictable answers make cyber criminals' task far harder.

SET UP SECONDARY ACCOUNTS

Some services provide the facility to add secondary accounts, phone numbers and so on to help with potentially recovering your account. Make sure you set these u they will be vital if you're having trouble logging in or if you're trying to take back control of your account after a cyber

11. KEEP HOME DEVICES UPDATED

Download official software updates for your household's mobile phones, laptops, consoles and other internet-enabled devices regularly. Security improvements and fixes are a key feature of these updates – so by ensuring each device is running the latest version, you're making them more secure.

10. CHANGE DEFAULT IOT PASSWORDS —

Devices from the 'Internet of Things' (IoT), such as 'smart' home appliances, are often supplied with default passwords. This makes them quicker to set up, but also less secure – criminals can identify these standard passwords more easily, so change them on your lot devices.

9. CHECK FOR BREACHES

You can check if your personal information has been involved in any known data breaches by entering your email address at www.haveibeenpwned.com (yes, that spelling is correct!). It's useful if you're worried about a possible attack – or simply as motivation to review your account security.

8. KEEP HAVING FUN WITH TECH
