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ENRICHMENT LECTURE: ALEX HIBBERT - POLAR EXPLORER



On Wednesday 24th April, we are very excited to welcome Alex Hibbert. Alex is the world record-holding polar traveller who has skied further on an unsupported Arctic journey than anyone in history, and is one of only 11 people to have broken the polar unsupported 1000-mile barrier. In July 2008, Alex completed his 1374-mile, 113-day 'Long Haul' return crossing of a new ice sheet route along with team-mate George Bullard. They received no resupplies or physical support and completed the final week on almost no food. In addition to a practical workshop with some of our outdoor education students, Alex will be discussing his travels and experiences, in what promises to be a hugely exciting and unique talk.

Highly active in the polar and cold regions, Alex has led independent

projects for well over a decade.

Journeys since the Long Haul journey have included a high-speed icecap crossing (330 miles in less than 12 days), an on-going Dark Ice Project (North Pole in winter via a novel route) and nearly half a year living with the Polar Eskimos.

He is a prolific speaker with business clients including Rolls-Royce and Aberdeen Asset Management, and has also been a guest speaker at both Cambridge University and the Oxford Union. Alex has authored four books; The Long Haul, Maybe, Kalaallit Nunaat and Polar Eskimo, and has appeared as an expert commentator on Sky News, the BBC, Channel 4, FIVE and for national newspapers. His photographic collection has been published in every corner of the globe and he has been a BBC Wildlife Photographer of the Year finalist

three times - this passion for the natural world leading to a degree in biology from Oxford University.

Alex has been described as 'ground-breaking' by Sir Ranulph Fiennes, 'passionate... and fascinating' by Wanderlust magazine and his strong writing style has attracted both accolades and debate. He has a growing social media audience exceeding 100,000 subscribers.

Alex's lecture will be a rare opportunity to hear from such a ground-breaking and experienced explorer. It will take place on Wednesday 24th April at 16:15, and as always, it would be lovely to see some of you there. Do email at rcw@yarmschool.org if you would like further information.

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POPPY JOY CAREER CATCH UP



We recently caught up with Poppy Joy who left Yarm School last summer and has embarked

on an exciting career in the world of fashion. Poppy took a chance on choosing not to go to university, but rather to launch herself directly into her chosen profession.

Tell us about your current role? What does a normal day look like for you?

I currently work in fashion PR and communications which involves working alongside some of the largest international fashion companies to ensure promotion of new products reach target audiences via the use of different marketing channels. I work 5 days in the office which means I work an all round job when it comes to PR, every day is different and usually involves packing and sending samples out to stylists for magazine shoots and celebrities, creating PR packages for influencers and press to promote new releases and working from the in the office showroom to ensure new product is featured. I also cover press for certain brand accounts which involves reading fashion

magazines such as Vogue on the daily which I love.

How did you land this current role? I think you did an internship beforehand. Can you tell us about that and the application process for your current job?

After deciding not to go to University and deciding to dive straight into work, I used connections within the fashion industry to gain an internship for a fashion rental company where I was able to take on multiple roles and gain valuable experience. Pretty Little Thing offered me an internship with them off the experience I had previously gained and here I worked a PR role which I loved and knew I wanted to carry on with this role. I relocated to London for this internship which lasted around a month, when it ended I decided to stay down in London and ended up applying for the job I now have.

How are you adapting to living in London? Does that feel like a big change from your previous life in Teesside? What are the best parts of it and what has been more challenging?

I love living in London. I always knew I wanted to live in a big city at one point in my life but honestly thought that would be a long time in the future. I'm very extroverted so I

love how social London is, I enjoy going out and dressing up which I never got to do as much in Teesside. Luckily I knew people down in London so it was pretty easy for me to integrate into London life. It's extremely different to Teesside however I come home regularly to see my family which I'm so grateful I am able to do as often as I can. I had four days to move down to London so it was very stressful to begin with trying to find both accommodation and pack all my things, I wasn't sure how it was going to work out but i'm so glad I took the risk as I now feel like i'm living my dream life!

What would you say prepared you well for your current work? Are there experiences you had at school, or maybe outside of school that have helped you in your journey?

I honestly don't think I could have prepared for what I'm doing now, certain experiences throughout my life definitely helped shape resilience which massively helped when it came to getting rejected from certain jobs. I like to always be positive about things that don't always work out as even though it can be frustrating there's always something better that comes later down the line.

I know it's early days but how do you see your career developing?
What might be the next steps, and what would be the dream job and location?

My ultimate dream is to live in Malibu and own my own designer vintage store or my own clothing brand. For the near future, i'm staying down in London and gaining relevant industry experience. I would like to travel around South East Asia

and spend a few summers in Ibiza before I move to California and settle down with a job out there.

What advice would you give to other students perhaps considering a similar type of career in your sector?

Take on any opportunity given to you even if it's not exactly what you want to do within the industry, experience is the most valuable and crucial component when applying for

jobs in fashion. My first few internships were unpaid but the experience gained from them helped me achieve my first paid job. Also don't be afraid to ask around, if you know someone or have any connections, the worst someone can say is "no" and most of the time people would be more than happy to help.
