Year 3 York Residential

Our residential to York was a wonderful experience for all involved. We set off on a cold, wet and rather dreary Monday morning. Our first stop was Sutton Bank where we walked across the top of the hill to see the famous White Horse of Kilburn. After lunch, which was eaten at the Visitor's Centre, we returned to the coach to head for York. Having arrived in the city centre close to Clifford's Tower, we disembarked from the coach and walked to the Jorvik Centre. As we walked down to the reconstructed Viking village, we paused to talk about the archaeology of York and primary evidence. We then travelled around and looked at the people working in the village and experienced the authentic smells. Next, we went to see the new sculpture of Queen Elizabeth Il and admired the architecture of the famous Minster. Our final activity of the day was Ask Italian where we thoroughly enjoyed a delicious dinner. It was then time to go to the Racecourse Centre and find out with whom we were sleeping, (certainly the most frequent question of the previous week!)



On Tuesday morning, after a leisurely start to the morning and a hearty breakfast, we departed the Racecourse and travelled to Murton Park. We spent the first part of the day demonstrating our superb Viking knowledge and then it was time to get in role which involved wearing a tunic and working in the Viking village. We quickly met the Chief who kindly allowed us to join him and we were given four different jobs to complete in return for a home and protection. Our tasks were: 'guard duty,' quern stone milling, tallow lamp clay sculpting and learning to play a Viking 'tafl' game. At the end of the afternoon, we skilfully defended our village against a rogue Anglo Saxon and set off back for Yarm. This was the first residential experience for our Year 3 children and they were a pleasure to stay with, upheld our School Values and are definitely looking forward to more Yarm adventures next year. Well done to all of the children in Year 3.

The 11th Teesside Individual Chess Championships took place at Yarm Preparatory School on Saturday 8th June and the tournament attracted just over 80 entries from a plethora of local schools.

We had a fabulous day of chess, with all of the title battles proving to be tough, with no easy wins to be had anywhere.

It was particularly pleasing to see a lot of children playing in one of our events for the first time.

Shanaya Chauhan is the new Teesside Under-7 Girls' Champion and Arya Jafari finished in third place in the same section.

The Under-9 section was the largest section and our players were up against numerous very tough players from other schools and clubs.

Dara Jafari is the new Under -9 Boys' Teesside Champion, winning the section with a perfect score of 5/5. One of the best performances of the day saw Daniel Shavit

outscore several other top players to claim second place all to himself; easily his best performance to date.

The new Under-9 Girls' Champion is Scarlett Yang. Jayden Wang and Paari Muthukrishnan shared third place in the toughest section of the day.

Our players did very well in the Under-11 section. The Teesside Boys' Champion is Miles Page, who won the tournament with 5/5 and the Girls' Champion is Kaira Nalawade, who finished just half a point behind Miles.

Phoenix Emadi and Kavan Sidhu shared third place.

Sports Round-Up

North-East Junior Schools Athletics (formerly HMC Schools)

We took our U9/10 and U11's to this prestigious event with over 500 children competing from 16 schools altogether. It was a great atmosphere with children cheering each other on and pushing themselves to firstly make the finals for their event and then to try and get a place on the podium. Throughout the day we had success and the U10 and U11 relays teams made their respective finals. We enjoyed success in the javelin events with Rex White setting a new record of 26.02 metres and Heidi Kingsbury winning the same event for the second year running. Dax Cullingford won the U10 javelin and once again set a new record of 22.94m with his effort. In the U9 girls Amelie Tailor threw the vortex well and finished on the podium in 3rd place. Austin Oman also in the U9's finished 3rd in the long jump with a distance of 3.05m. On the track we had two runners up with Annabelle Andrews and Manha Abdullah securing 2nd places in their respective 80m sprints. Amelia Cheesman secured another 3rd place in the 100m final towards the end of the day.

Overall the U9 girls finished 11th out of 16 schools and the boys 10th. The U10 girls finished 7th out of 16 and the boys 9th. Finally the U11 girls finished 5th and the boys 4th so as a year group they placed the highest overall from Yarm.

Overall, it was a fantastic day with lots of positives to take from it. Well done to all who competed for school.

North-East Junior Schools Tennis (formerly HMC Schools)

Well done to the tennis players who travelled to Dame Allan's to play in the annual HMC doubles competition.

Our first boys pair of Hugo and Noah played 3 matches in their pool, narrowly losing to RGS 7-8 but beating both Ashville and Durham 12 -3 and 8-6. They progressed to the plate and won one and lost one so finished second overall in the competition. The first pair of girls saw Ellie A and Annalise beat RGS 8-5, GSAL 8-0 and Ashville 8-6 so topped their group. They then progressed to the cup competition. They beat GSAL's first pair 15-6 and lost to a fantastic pair from RGS 9-12 which meant they finished 2nd overall out of 9 teams.

The children were excellent throughout and a pleasure to spend the day with. Well done Hugo, Noah, Ellie and Annalise.




Reports released to parents (All year groups)

Summer Fair (All year groups)

The fair map can be seen below! Holding the event on a Friday has proven to be very popular with the children. As such we want to make the fair open to all children in the school community as well as their parents.



We would like to draw your attention to a few logistical matters regarding the fair.

- •It will be a non-uniform day.
- •Lunch will take place as normal.
- •School will finish at the usual times 3.30pm for Pre-Prep and 3.45pm for Prep.
- •Pre-Prep children can be collected from 2.30pm to come to the fair. Although the school day finishes at the usual time, parents of Pre-Prep children are welcome to collect early and bring their children to the fair. Pre-Prep will also be given priority to go on the rides between 2.30-3pm. Children who are in Pre-Prep on the day of the fair will also get to enjoy a special show by Tom Rolfe in the morning!
- Parents of Y3-6 children are also welcome to come along from 2.30pm. However, if you are taking your child home at the end of the school day, you must let your child's form teacher know.

•All Year 3-6 children will need to bring some money. £15 max in change/coins (no notes please) should be plenty to have a go at the variety of games and activities taking place! This will be collected by form teachers for safekeeping during morning registration and handed out prior to the fair. All proceeds go to the YPSSC and the many projects they support the school with.

- •Parents of Y3-6 children can buy a rides wristband prior to the event. There will be a wide range of fairground rides for the children to go on, with a wristband being available to purchase before the fair for £7. The YPSSC will be providing further details in due course.
- •Parents of Pre-Prep children can buy a rides wristband prior to the event and collect them on the day at the gate. The wristbands will also be available on the day of the fair for all families.
- •The fair will be fully supervised. Teachers will be present supervising those children at the fair from 2pm. From pick-up onwards we would love parents to come along and join the fun too!
- •Pick up, after school care and buses will run as normal. Pick up from after school care from 4pm will be from the Pre-Prep.
- •Year 6 will be expected to stay until 5.30pm. A letter has gone out to Year 6 parents with full details.
- •There will be no after school clubs on this date. Gymnastics, football and drama will not be taking place.

Tooled Up Education

Sport is in the air at the moment! Cricket fans might be glued to the T20 World Cup, Euro 2024 kicks off soon in Germany, and the Paris Olympics are just a few weeks away.

Sport is important in our children's lives, too, which is why at Tooled Up, sport is central to our thinking about physical health and emotional wellbeing. So we want to make sure that as many of our children are staying physically active as possible, and that they're preparing to succeed by learning about caring for their bodies.

A great place to start is this <u>overview</u> of the importance of physical activity for young people, and the benefits for academic performance, mental health and body image. Then think about the food children need to give their sporting performance a boost: our <u>article</u> on Sports Day Nutrition and our more detailed <u>webinar</u>: Optimising Nutrition For Young Athletes.

Research tells us too many adolescent girls are dropping out of sports during their early teen years, mainly due to body image concerns. Two informative presentations on girls and sport are with Dr Emma Ross on <u>Talking More Openly About Female Bodies</u>, and Dr Kat Schneider who addresses body talk and <u>Body Confidence</u>.

Another event this week for many Tooled Up families in the UK is Fathers' Day! It's a great time to think about the role that fathers play in their families and how fathers can be supported.

In this <u>podcast</u>, Dr Kathy Weston talks to CEO Paul Pomroy about how he balances roles as a busy executive and loving, engaged Dad!. You can also listen to Dr Weston's <u>talk</u> with Adrienne Burgess of the Fatherhood Institute on how paternal mental and physical health might affect children, and how Dads can most effectively influence children's engagement with learning. In this <u>podcast</u>, Dr Hope Christie talks with three expert panellists on fathers' mental health, and how we can support fathers to have the best possible relationship with their children.

And don't forget this week's <u>Wednesday Wisdom</u>, featuring Andrew Smith of the charity Little People, on his experiences of fatherhood and dwarfism.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

POP-UP ADS

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Pop-up advertisements have been a staple of the internet since they were first introduced in the late 1990s. This form of advertising causes a small window or banner to appear in the foreground while someone is browsing a website. Although these adverts are merely irritating for most people, pop-ups can present more severe risks to younger users.

DECEPTIVE TACTICS

Children sometimes don't understand that adverts (including pop-ups) are designed to sell a product — and can't distinguish between a legitimate feature of a site and an advertisement. Video games, for example, can be full of pop-up ads that tempt users into spending money, yet they might take the form of a mini-game or extra level.

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

While some adverts are targeted based on a user's interests and activity online, that isn't always the case. This means that children may unfortunately be exposed to ads for age-inappropriate goods or services such as tobacco products, alcohol and gambling sites.

MALWARE RISK

Most pop-ups from reputable advertisers are safe. However, in some cases, pop-ups can trick you into downloading malware – whereby cybercriminals install software on your device, allowing them to access your sensitive data. It can be difficult to know if malware has been installed on your device, so your best option is to avoid engaging with these pop-ups altogether. Be wary of sites that suddenly bombard you with ads or try to prevent you from leaving.

GN UP TOD PRIVACY RIS

Many app and game developers will collect their users' personal data, such as their name, address, email address, geolocation information, unique numerical identifiers, photos and payment information. If a child clicks on an illegitimate pop-up laced with malware, all this information could be put at risk.

RACKING UP BILLS

If a child has access to a payment card on their device – be it a smartphone, laptop, or tablet – they could very quickly rack up a massive bill by interacting with pop-up adverts and buying products shown to them. Try to keep a close eye on their spending.

BEHAVIOURAL IMPACT

Research has found that pop-up ads can even have an impact on children's behaviour. Some of these adverts use manipulative tactics that take advantage of children's developmental vulnerabilities, intentionally or otherwise. This approach may cause a child's mood to shift: becoming more stubborn, for example, if they begin wanting their parents to buy a specific product for them.

START A CONVERSATION

It's important to have regular conversations with children about online advertising so that they understand the risks of interacting with pop-ups. For example, if a child asks for a product which has been advertised to them online, ask them why they want it and how they found it: this will present an opportunity to talk youngsters through the tactics used in online marketing.

SPOT THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that a child may be following pop-up ads to make online purchases or viewing content that could be harmful, it's important to be able to spot the signs. Due to the often-manipulative nature of these adverts, children who interact with them regularly may show signs of distraction, stubbornness and an increasingly materialistic

MONITOR CONTENT

It can often be difficult to spot when a pop-up advert is malicious – even more so for impressionable younger users. It's important to monitor the content they're consuming to prevent them from clicking on something dangerous. If a pop-up ad seems too good be true – promising a free iPad, for example – it probably is.

PRIVACY SETTINGS

Most modern devices have privacy settings that let you limit the amount of advertising a child is subjected to while using apps or browsing the internet. You may also want to speak to teachers about avoiding sites and apps with advertising, as well as adjusting digital privacy settings on any education technology they use.

LIMIT SPENDING

IVIILAE

Try to stay aware of what children are spending and ensure that payment details aren't linked to or saved on the gaming platform that they use. Most video games and internet-enabled devices have settings that can help you manage what children can or cannot purchase online.

CUT DOWN ON SCREEN TIME

Given the prevalence of pop-up ads (which can appear on everything from smartphones and tablets to internet-connected toys and games), it might be beneficial to limit the time children spend on digital devices to curb their exposure to digital advertising.


