FRENCH STUDENTS RECREATE TRIAL

Last Friday, Upper Sixth French students reenacted Maréchal Pétain's trial from 1945, during which he chose to collaborate with the German Nazis in World War II. The script was carefully crafted to ensure that each of us portrayed our characters to the best of our ability. Alex played the judge, overseeing the order of the trial and playing a crucial role in determining the proceedings and outcomes. Dan took on the role of Maréchal Pétain, presenting strong evidence and arguments in defense of in the Vichy regime. I highlighted how his character. Ellie was cast as Sarah Weissmann, the first witness, who opposed Pétain's claims of innocence as she recounted the horrific conditions endured by those in the Vel d'Hiv. Our second witness, Izzy, portrayed Pierre Laval, the French

Prime Minister during the Vichy regime in World War II, known for his collaboration with Nazi Germany and significant role in the government established after France's defeat in 1940. Given the nature of his character, Izzy's role focused on proving Pétain's innocence, arguing that he only wanted to protect France. I played the defense lawyer, tasked with defending Pétain against the allegations regarding his involvement Pétain aimed to "reclaim France's freedom" and pointed out that "the chief police were to blame," though we all know the reality. Eleanor represented the prosecution, arguing against Pétain's actions by emphasizing the death toll and the



concentration camps that many endured. Our jury consisted of three members: Mr Bridges, Mr Ravenhall, and Miss Huynh-Seyvoz, who concluded that, based solely on our scripted arguments and follow-up questions, the defense won the case. Overall, it was a great opportunity for us all to improve our pronunciation and speaking as well as solidifying our knowledge on a key topic from our A Level course.

This week's EconBus Soc saw James Muir return for his second presentation of the year, this time joined by Harvey Qin, to explore the fascinating and controversial topic of sportswashing. Together, they delved into its impact on sports across the globe, with examples ranging from commonwealth games in Glasgow to golf in Saudi Arabia.

James provided a detailed analysis of LIV Golf and how its rise has reshaped the future of the sport as whether or not it has undermined traditional tours such as the PGA tour due to the drastically increased salaries on the LIV golf tours. Their

thought-provoking presentation sparked a lively discussion about whether sportswashing is a good thing for countries, helping to improve their international reputation, or if it's just a way to distract people from controversial or unethical issues.

FORMER STUDENTS STEPS INTO WESTMINSTER POLITICS



Emily Carter left Yarm School just two years ago and is currently a student at the University of Leeds reading Politics and Parliamentary Studies. The course has been a popular one with Politics students over the years and it is easy to see why. Starting with a degree in Politics, at the end of the first year students apply to join a small cohort of selected students who will extend their course by a year and spend this (third) year in Westminster at the office of a Member of Parliament. Over the years the likes of Mark Taylor, Eva Mason and Amy Booth have followed this path, one proving very useful for those wishing to develop a career in some area of politics after graduation.

The onus of responsibility for finding an MP to work with falls to the student, and there is some strategy in this. Too 'prominent' an MP and a student may find themselves one of many staffers in their office. A couple of years ago Amy Booth's placement led to her taking up a position as Parliamentary Assistant and then Senior Parliamentary Assistant to the Rt Hon Nigel Evans, Former MP to the Ribble Valley, Former Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons. Prior to this Eve Mason spent her year with a recently elected member of the Labour Party, Wes Streeting, now a senior member of the government team as Secretary of State for Health and Social Care.

Emily secured a place with Afzal Khan, CBE, a Labour Party politician and the Member of Parliament for Manchester Rusholme since 2017. He was formerly Lord Mayor of Manchester for 2005–2006, and served as a Member of the European Parliament for North West England from 2014 to 2017. Emily spoke at length to members of the Politics

Society about her experiences to date. It was fascinating to learn how much consultation she has been involved in, again a serendipitous aspect of the MP and their office. She has to date been involved in briefings, as well as writing questions that have been asked in the House of Commons. Based in Westminster means Emily's day to day is at the very heart of the nation's politics, with other staff members taking responsibility for constituency matters. Emily spoke of the atmosphere of Westminster in terms of hierarchies and behaviour, as well as admitting to a few moments of being star-struck holding open doors and dashing up and down stairs and corridors with all manner of household names. Emily gave a superbly insightful and articulate presentation, followed by a diverse range of answers to the discussion that followed. It was great to see these first steps in what promises to be an exciting career whatever future direction Emily takes.

A GUIDE ON HOW NOT TO BE A PREEN ZOM



It's not always easy to tell if you've been spending too much time on your device. Mobiles phones, tablets, games consoles, TVs; the list of devices you might have access to seems never-ending and switching between them can be seamless. Spending too much time on social media watching YouTube or playing games online can result in you becoming a screen zombie. Limiting your screen time will keep you alert, keep your mind focused and help to look after your own mental health and wellbeing.

BE PRESENT, NOT A ZOMBIE

Screen zombies often find that they spend a lot of time alone in front of their tablet or their mobile phone and reduce the time they spend with their friends or talk with their family. Zombies often lack communication skills. Always try to limit your screen time as much as possible - there's so much fun you can have with others!

Keeping your phone in your bedroom means that it can be tempting to check every notification you get. Your phone could be the last thing you see at night and the first thing you see in the morning. This can contribute towards poor sleep and a lack of focus the next

day. Try to keep your phone out of your bedroom or turn off all notifications before bedtime. This will mean you'll get a good night's rest and be ready for the next day.



Screen zombies usually find that they spend a lot of time inside as they lose interest in other things that don't include their device.

It might seem obvious, but meeting your friends outside or doing outdoor activities like playing sports, trampolining, camping or just going for a walk are all healthy replacements for screen time and can help keep your mind fresh and active.

Mealtimes can be seen as a good time to sit down, relax and switch on your tablet or phone as you eat your food. But it can also mean that you're not interacting with others, sharing jokes at the dinner table or just talking about your day. Spending too much time on your device and online can increase your chances of potentially encountering other online dangers. This can include simple things like unlimited scrolling on a newsfeed, 'streaks' or uncovering hidden levels. Be mindful of how much time you're online and try to remember you're in control. You decide when you've had enough, not your device.

SAVE YOUR PARENTS!

Even though your parents will often be the ones telling you to limit your screen time, turn off your tablet or switch off your phone, sometimes they will forget to take their own advice. So it's up to you to make sure you remind them of the dangers of becoming a screen zombie!
