Last week was Yarm School's Eco Week where the whole school got involved in a range of fantastic activities to raise awareness of eco-related issues.

In the Dining Hall, pupils scrapped their own food waste to highlight the problem of food wastage and try to encourage them to ask for smaller portion sizes and reduce their individual waste. After only the first day, we saw a significant fall in the total amount of food waste produced by the school, dropping from a total of 90.7Kg on Monday to 73.7Kg on Tuesday. By Thursday the total food waste was only 51.8Kg, showing the amazing difference we all made. We also had a green food day and a range of plant-based food options on Thursday lunchtime, to encourage more sustainable food choices.

The smoothie bike was a huge success! Pupils and staff chose their own fruit and then cycled to power the smoothie blender and raised over £50. A huge thank you to the staff that work in the Dining Hall and kitchen that helped with these eco initiatives.

Other fun activities included the Eco-football competition, making bird feeders, painting bee feeders and completing the Eco week quizzes. Thank you to everyone for coming along and getting involved. Congratulations to Yanited FC captained by Ethan Cowley who won the First and Second Year Eco-football tournament and to the World Wanderers captained by ThienAnh Diep who won the Sixth Form Eco-football tournament. The competition raised over £70 to go towards Eco-causes.

We also launched the Eco-Marine Art Competition. For anyone who would like to enter, the theme of the artwork must either be marine biology or the conservation of marine ecosystems and participants must use at least some form of recycled material within their art piece. The closing date for the competition is Friday 4th May and the winning entry will be displayed on our Eco board and receive a bistro voucher. We can't wait to see what pupils create!

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BOYS HOCKEY REPORT

Ist XI: One Step Away from the Olympic Stadium

What a week for the Boys 1st XI Hockey team they pushed Repton all the way in the National Independent Schools Cup Quarter Final last Tuesday before beating King's Chester to reach the National England Hockey Schools Cup Semi Final.

This scoreline flattered Repton somewhat as Yarm dominated the first 20 minutes of this encounter with 2 well executed short corners saved on the line by some outstanding defending. 15 minutes in saw Jack Van Niekerk shoot from close range into the far corner but just as Yarm looked like they were to take the lead, the German keeper dived full length to tip the ball around the post.

Repton are full of scholarship players (many of which are junior international players) brought in specifically to win national tournaments like this and the fact that this Yarm group can go toe to toe with such company is exceptional.

The missed opportunities cost us as Repton grew into the game and scored a superb Reverse hit from close range and a short corner either side of half time. This made it very difficult as Yarm had to chase the game. Max Mowbray was exceptional throughout as he hit Repton at speed on the counter attack to create many chances but it was not to be our day. Repton scored late on to secure the 3-0 win but as mentioned, the scoreline certainly did not reflect the game.

The boys were very disappointed but can be very proud of the performance at this level- I certainly was!

Yarm 10-4 King's Chester Thursday 20th March

Yarm used their Repton disappointment to fuel another strong performance against our perennial north rivals- King's Chester in the National Quarter Finals.

King's boast a current England U18 International as centre forward but we had a plan to deal with him in the form of Marcus Walters. Yarm bossed many of the local encounters but failed to convert some easy opportunities which added to the anxiety levels given the significance of the game. However, Will Ferguson scored what is fast becoming a trademark bottom corner drag flick before Max Mowbray dribbled through to produce a well executed reverse stick to move the score to 2-0. More goals were to follow from a number of players but a drop in intensity as the game wore on allowed King's too many opportunities, hence the 4 goals. However, the boys can be happy they were able to knock 10 past such esteemed opponents even though the coach's assessment was a 5 out of 10 performance!





Livestreaming has become a big part of the entertainment people consume, and what began as a series of gamers sharing their screens has grown into a huge industry packed with personalities - and potential risks for your children. With over 2.5 million people watching Twitch, the most popular streaming service, at any one time, it's important to remain aware of the risks associated with streamers.

Some gaming streamers will stick to family-friendly titles, but others will play more violent games that tend to be more popular. Non-gaming streamers could, in theory, discuss just about anything, and some streamers will often stream in revealing outfits.

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NEGATIVE INFLUENCES

While things have improved, streamers are often paid by companies to promote products and this isn't always stated explicitly. While it's unlikely these goods will be harmful to your child, some streamers and influencers have engaged (knowingly or not) in scams in the past

FINANCIAL HARM

Streamers will often have donation buttons on their screens for users to submit money. What can start as small amounts can quickly spiral as streamers engage with paying viewers more often, potentially leading to financial issues.

UNREALISTIC **EXPECTATIONS**

Influencers often showcase how glamourous their lives are, making some users feel as though they are lesser. However, it's important to stress that, in many ways, this is an act, or at the very least, not common. Logan Paul, who has been successful as a streamer and influencer, has a Pokemon card worth \$5 million, but this is atypical of anyone working in the medium.

MISINFORMATION

60 Streamers are, in many ways, just like us - and they can get things wrong or reel off an opinion without having thought about it. Some can simply say awful things to get a rise out of viewers or to sway them to their side of a hot topic.
